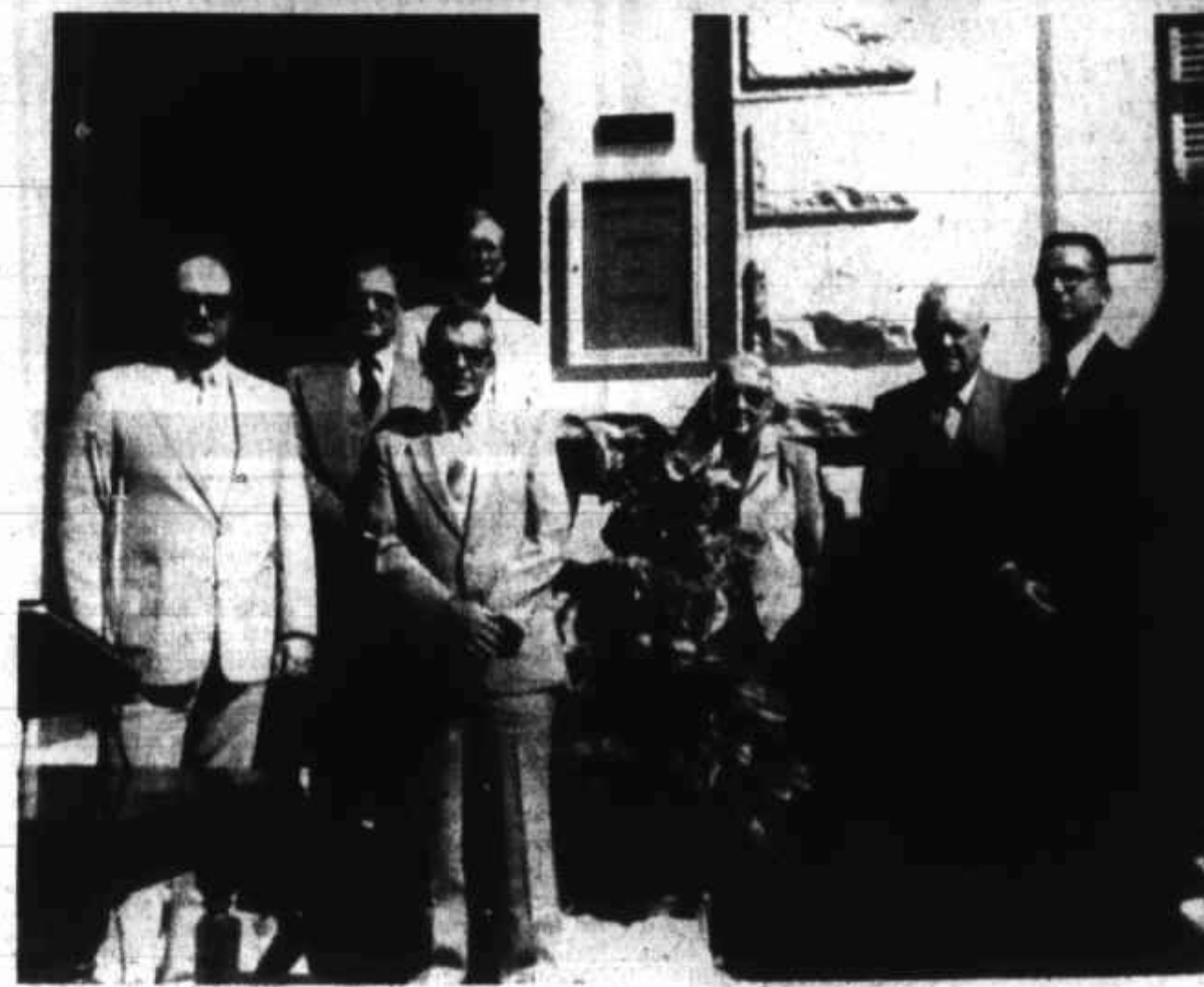

Decision Handed Down By State Water Board On Lone Star Levee

Citizens of the area will be interested to learn that the Texas Department of Water Resources' Texas Water Commission has ruled in the application of Lone Star Industries, Inc. for the construction of a levee and other improvements along the Colorado River near the company's Roan Bend plant southeast of Garwood. The Commission granted a motion made by Walter Braden, Jr. of Garwood and others, seeking a rehearing on the proposed levee construction; and deleted "Finding of Fact No. 25" which stated: "The proposed project is not intended or designed to restrain or carry water or to prevent inundation of any lands, nor is it intended or designed to protect any lands from overflow."

The Commission overruled a motion for rehearing filed by Lone Star Industries, Inc. and Blue Roan Bend Corporation. The commission's chief clerk, Mary Ann Heiler, informed interested parties that on August 17, 1981, the Commission considered a motion for rehearing and modified its decision in the matter of Lone Star Industries, Walter Braden and others and Roan Bend Corporation. Findings Of Fact On the 27th of January, 1981, the application came for

He said that businesses and business-persons not conveniently located in the community will be contacted by letter so they have an opportunity to contribute. "Our idea is to contact community members through the businesses they work for, or own, but our goal is to reach everyone in the community."

Council Acts To Up Parking Meter Fines

The first reading of an amendment to the Parking Meter Ordinance raising parking meter fines was approved on a split vote by the Eagle Lake City Council, in session on Tuesday night of this week. The amendment, if approved on two more readings scheduled for October 13th and 24th, will raise parking meter fines from 25c to \$1.00 if the fine is paid within 24 hours. Any fines paid after the 24 hour period will be subject to a fine of not less than \$3.00 and not more than \$10.00. The meters were sacked through July and August; however, they are again being worked by local police officers. Parked vehicles are subject to a fine from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Only on Sundays and legal holidays are the meters not worked.
