Waterfowl Stamp To Aid Research

The new \$5 stamp required for Texas duck and goose hunters during the 1981-82 hunting seasons will be a valuable management tool for the state's waterfowl biologists.

Revenues from sales of the stamp are to be spent on waterfowl research, management and habitat acquisition, leasing and development. Additionally, the names, addresses and telephone numbers of stamp purchasers will provide a base for harvest surveys in the future.

"Being able to poll hunters who hunt waterfowl will be a great help to the department," said Bill Brownlee, migratory bird program director. "In the past it has been difficult to obtain a sampling of waterfowl hunters from information provided by hunting licenses."

The stamps are available at department offices and at hunting license outlets across the state. Federal law also requires waterfowl hunters to purchase a federal migratory waterfowl stamp, available at most post offices.

A non-toxic (steel) shot seminar conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and sponsored by the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas (SCOT), was presented in El Campo Tuesday and will present another this Wednesday in Wharton.

The Wharton seminar will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Wharton Community Center.

"While deaths in Texas due to lead poisoning have not been massive," said Alan Allen, Executive Director of SCOT, "as they have been in some states, deaths in Texas could be termed chronic in that losses occur daily during the winter periods."

P&W Commission Sets Furbearer Seasons

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has adopted regulations for the taking of fur-bearing animals during the 1981-82 seasons.

The seasons are basically the same as in the past, but the resident trapper's license will cost \$10.75 this year instead of \$5, as a result of a bill passed by the Texas Legislature in its recent session.

The open seasons are: muskrat, Nov. 15, 1981, through Mar. 15, 1982; nutria, no closed season; beaver, otter, mink, ring-tailed cat, badger, skunk, fox, weasel, opossum, raccoon and civet cat, Dec. 1, 1981, through Jan. 31, 1982.

Furbearers may be taken during the open season by the following means and methods: firearms, steel leg hold traps and conibear traps, falconry, bow traps, dogs, snares, long bow and arrow, and with hand-held or electronic calls. Exceptions are: river otters may not be taken with firearms; furbearers may not be used except during the open fur-bearing season, and they may not be used within 400 yards of any school. No smoke, explosives or chemicals may be used to kill or flush furbearing animals.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — The Redistricting Board heard public testimony during two days of public hearings last week but no hearing is close to being approved.

Apparently, only three members of the board are opposed to the plan. The whole panel: Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby will plan for the Senate. Speaker Bill Clayton will plan for the House, and Comptroller Bob Bullock will counter with alternate maps for each chamber of the Legislature.

At issue again is where the five-member board will be able to legally split counties to comply with the one-man, one-vote constitutional provision. In August, a state district court judge threw out the Legislature's plan for the House of Representatives on the grounds it illegally divided counties.

The Texas Constitution prohibits cutting county lines in redistricting to discourage gerrymandering. However, more recent court decisions allow counties to be split in order to comply with the one-man, one-vote provision. Also at issue is whether minority voting strength will be diluted.

Not much change in the Coastal Plains weather picture is expected through Wednesday. Widely scattered thunder-showers will continue in the Coastal Bend as a large area of moisture and clouds lingers over the Southwestern Gulf. Fair, quite warm weather will continue in the Rice Belt, except for early morning fog. Weather conditions the latter half of the week will depend upon the movement of the Gulf moisture area, and upon an upper level system in the Southwestern States.

In the Rice Belt, nighttime startups will continue to be the rule for quality cotton picking the next couple of days. Harvesting may be limited to just a few hours in the afternoon close to the Coast. Flexibility in scheduling further hay cuttings will be needed until weather patterns for the late week period become more definite.

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
