to the abutting property owners at the state appraised price, should be given on the east end of the segment where the one-acre tract is located.

Property Is Improved

Kohlfeldt contended that he had improved his property in the area over the years, despite the fact that the city placed a large drainage ditch in the area and has used some of the property for utility easements, some in writing and some not.

City Manager Klockman said that the city desires the county to take some kind of action on declaring the property surplus, so that it can revert to ownership of the county. The county can at its option sell or give the land to the city and the city in turn deed the land to Kohlfeldt for written utility easements across his properties in the area.

The court finally took action on the matter which in effect asks the Texas Highway Commission to declare the property as surplus as far as the state is concerned.

2nd Reading Of Parking Meter Rate Ord. Oct. 13

Council Proposes To Increase Fine From \$25 To \$1.00

The Eagle Lake city council is expected to approve the second of three readings of an amendment to the Parking Meter Ordinance which will raise parking meter fines when it meets in regular session on Tuesday, October 13th.

In its regular session on Tuesday of last week, the council OK'd the first reading of the amendment that will increase current fines from \$25 to \$1.00 if paid within 24 hours and \$3.00 for tickets paid after the 24-hour period. The approval of the first reading came on a split decision with councilman Roy D. Van Nort casting the only dissenting vote.

A decision was made by the council early in September that the parking meters would remain in the downtown area and that they would be worked on a regular basis. However, Van Nort indicated that he would need to "see more proof" that they are being worked before he would support any action on the parking meters.

Council To Consider Flood Plain Ord. Tues., Oct. 13

Eagle Lake City Council in session on Tuesday night of last week discussed plans to adopt a Flood-Plain Ordinance which "is due for adoption" at the next session of the council Tuesday, Oct. 13th.

According to city manager Robert Klockman, the proposed ordinance would allow the city to issue permits to persons who wish to build or alter any structures in the 100-year flood plain area of the city. Such permits are needed for financing by any federally-funded institution.

To demolish houses in other action the council authorized the city manager to advertise for bids for the demolition of an estimated 29 houses in the "flat" section of the city which are considered to be in violation of the city's "Dangerous Building Ordinance" which was passed recently by the council.

Letters were sent to the owners of the structures informing them that the houses "did not stand up to standards" set forth by the ordinance, said city manager Klockman. Funding of the demolition project will come through the Community Development Block Grant which the city received from the department of Housing and Urban Development for drainage improvements, rehabilitation and demolition in the area south of East Main Street.

The council also heard a report from the Texas Highway Department that it plans to overlay East Main Street (Highway 90A) in the near future.

The council also heard a report from its insurance committee on a Public Official's Liability policy; however, no action was taken as that more information on the policy can be obtained.

2 Missing Vehicles Are Recovered

Two vehicles reported as stolen to the County Sheriff's Dept. have been recovered. On September 19th, Alvin G. Faltchinger of Altair reported to the County Sheriff's office that his gravel truck and trailer had been

presented by city manager Robert Klockman at the Oct. 13th meeting.

City officials remind citizens that the meters are back in operation and that visitors are subject to citations Monday through Saturday from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Only on Sundays and legal holidays are the meters not worked.

Until the amendment is approved on three readings, the fines will remain at \$25 and are payable at the city office or by placing the ticket, along with the fine, in one of several red dispensers attached to meter poles, in the downtown area.
