P&WD Says Duck & Goose Seasons Are "Still On"

Despite rumors to the contrary, duck and goose seasons in Texas are still on, according to wildlife officials at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Reports of pesticide contamination in waterfowl found in Montana have kept P&WD phone lines busy for the past week, but Wildlife Division director Ted Clark said that at the moment there is no change in waterfowl seasons for the state.

The Montana pesticide problem started in spring 1981 when some 120,000 acres of wheat in the eastern part of that state were sprayed with Endrin to control cutworms. Endrin is a highly toxic, persistent pesticide which concentrates in the fat and soft tissues of animals.

Because of this toxicity, the Montana Department of Game, Fish and Parks started taking samples of that state's wildlife. They found Endrin concentrations in sharp-tail grouse which equal or exceed levels for pesticide contamination set by the Environmental Protection Agency for domestic red meat and poultry. Endrin residues also have been found in some waterfowl.

As a result of this, Montana game officials will meet Sept. 25 to consider closing the waterfowl seasons, set to open there October 5.

In order to assess the situation in Texas, the Central Flyway Council will provide Texas and other states with a computerized printout which will be used by P&WD officials to determine the potential distribution of any affected birds in Texas.

When that information is available, the department will develop a plan to sample waterfowl in the state as appropriate and make further recommendations.

Following the game, the Rice students and guests held a dance in the High School Commons.

The Raiders' spirit group formed the nucleus of the cheering section and also, designed and created beautiful displays through which the Raiders entered onto the field to open the game and at halftime.

Darden Speaks On Student Involvement In RHS Athletics

Rice High School Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Clifford Darden was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday of last week. He was introduced by Vance Duncan, program chairman for the day.

Coach Darden described the extracurricular programs available to Rice High School students noting that "we want people to get involved. He said the students are urged to participate, whether it be in band, athletics, academic programs or whatever and always to strive to do their best in whichever area they choose."

In discussing the Raider football prospects for the 1981 season, Coach Darden said that he likes "being picked as one of the top teams in District 22AAA. He noted that it is easier to instill pride and a desire to win in athletes who are part of a winning team than it is to instill these traits in a team at the bottom of the standings."

He said that the varsity athletes at Rice High School, especially in football, are working hard to meet this challenge. "We may not win them all, but we'll be there and make it tough on any one who tries to knock us off the top of the ladder."

He gave brief commentary on some of the Rice standouts for the 1981 football team acknowledging the fact that the team has excellent leadership on the field and has a fine coaching staff. He attributed the development in size and strength of the present athletes to a good "offseason" program initiated at Rice High School several years ago by then Raider Head Coach Mike Rice.

The coach ended his program by urging continued support from citizens in all segments in the district in all athletic programs, and especially in the current athletic season, District 22AAA football competition.

Gwynn, a certified wildlife biologist, headwinded the Texas A&M's Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Uvalde, says it's getting harder each year to predict the time hunting season that hunters can expect. Weather conditions and food availability are major considerations. With a good acorn crop and lush green forage available, deer will feed mostly at night and bed down during the day, making hunting more difficult.

He says an early frost or scarce food conditions during the season usually cause deer to roam more during daylight hours to seek food. Deer would then be more visible and available to hunters. They could also be more easily driven to baited stands.

Gwynn reminds landowners that deer census techniques and spotlight counts can be used to better determine deer populations and evaluate proper harvest levels. More can be learned about these techniques along with aging methods, harvest record systems and harvest recommendations through local county Extension agents or Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife officials.

Deer season opens in most Texas counties at sunrise on Nov. 14. Good hunting!

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Seminar On Steel Shot At Marvin's, Altair, Monday Nite

A no-toxic (steel) shot seminar conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and sponsored by the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas (SCOT), "as they have been in some states, dieoffs in Texas could be termed chronic in that losses occur daily during the wintering periods."

The upcoming deer season promises to be everything that last year's wasn't. Good forage and better than normal weather conditions should result in better quality deer than a year ago and more of them, according to a Texas Agricultural Extension Service wildlife specialist based in Uvalde.

Hunters can even expect better antlered deer from the improved nutrition which is a major contributing factor to their condition.

"Last year's drought effectively reduced the deer numbers in overpopulated areas," explains Dr. Dwight Gwynn. "This year there is more food for each animal which translates into good antler growth for bucks and higher fawn crops for does."

Higher fawn crops generally mean the deer herds are immediately beginning a population increase. Hence, Gwynn stresses that landowners and hunters can expect toward a larger female harvest this year in order to keep down the increasing deer population where desired.

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Rice Sophs Beat Waller 17-0; Freshmen, Junior Varsity Lose

JV Host Hempstead This Thursday Night; Fresh, Sophs Idle

The Rice High School sophomore football team salvaged the only win in three games played at Waller last week with an impressive 17-0 victory. The freshmen lost their contest 28-9 and the Raider JV lost 12-0 in the final game of the triple-header played in Waller on Thursday night.

This Thursday, only the junior varsity Raiders will be in action hosting Hempstead with game time set for 6:00 p.m. The freshmen and sophomores will return to action next Thursday, Oct. 15th.

Michael Davis scored a touchdown from six yards out and booted a 27 yard field goal to help lead Rice to the 17-0 win in the sophomore contest. Davis' touchdown came in the second quarter with Delbert Jarvis catching a pass from Cedric Pope for the extra points for an 8-0 halftime lead.

David kicked the field goal midway through the final period with Pope adding the final touchdown on a quarter back sneak from 16 yards out in the final seconds of the contest.

Other standouts in the game for Rice included fullback Clarence Spears, defensive lineman Charles

Tillman and punter Terry Cunningham.

Raider coach David White said he was "extremely proud" of the performance of his squad noting that "they played a good, solid, hard-fighting game."

Freshmen Loss 28-9 "Too many mistakes" led to the downfall of the Raider freshmen as they dropped a 28-9 decision to Waller. A pair of fumbles in the opening moments of the game helped the Bulldogs open up a 12-0 lead, which was enough for the win. But, despite a good effort by Rice in the second and third quarters, the mistakes returned in the final period as the opportunistic Bulldogs scored to a 28-0 win.

Rice JV Loss 12-0 The Raider JV gave up two first half touchdowns and failed to score late in the second quarter as it struggled to a 12-0 loss to Waller.

Waller's first TD came after its only two pass completions of the game. The first pass, a 24 yarder on a third down and 13 situation set up the Bulldogs on the 30. On the next play Waller connected again this time for 29 yards to the Raider one yard line to set up the first score. The second Waller score was set up by a five yard punt by Rice.

The Raiders threatened with 30 seconds left in the first half when Andy Anderson intercepted a pass and returned it 55 yards down to the 15. But Rice was unable to score before time expired. The Raiders also missed a good scoring opportunity in the closing moments of the game with a drive stalling at the one yard line with 23 seconds left.

The Raiders, coached by Gil Stalbaum and Maurice Gindrat, were led defensively by Frank Bittner, Jesse Rodriguez and David Cardenas, with seven tackles each. Leading rusher for Rice was Curtis Tillman (four rushes 32 yards) and he went out with a twisted ankle midway through the second quarter.

Three touchdowns in the second half rallied the Garwood-Sheridan Raiders to an 18-12 win over Louise last Thursday to top their record to 2-0 on the year.

Last Thursday in Garwood the Raiders overcame a 6-0 halftime deficit with a big play offense—and a stubborn defense to earn their second win.

Jimmy Botard connected with Darrell Pangel on a 13 yard pass for the Raiders' first score in the third quarter.

But Waller taking advantage of a Raider mistake tied the game in the second quarter on a 91 yard drive. The Raiders had an opportunity to pull two touchdowns ahead after picking up a first down and goal from the Waller nine. But a fumble on the pitchout gave the Bulldogs the ball and a couple of plays later they broke one for 91 yards to tie the score at 6-6.

It appeared the game would end in a tie but late in the fourth quarter the Raiders, pushed deep in their own territory, were forced to punt with the costly safety resulting.

It was a tough loss, according to coach Armstrong; however, he is expecting his team to bounce back this week with a good showing in Hempstead.

ELMS Raiders Lose Pair Of Games To Waller Last Thurs.

The Eagle Lake Middle School Raiders suffered a pair of disappointing losses to Waller last Thursday night with the seventh grade losing 22-8 and the eighth grade losing 6-8.

Both teams will try to get back in the win column this Thursday playing in Hempstead. The seventh grade will play the Bobcats at 5:30 with the eighth graders battling at 7:00 p.m.

Last Thursday in Eagle Lake the Raider seventh graders gave up a couple of costly late second touchdowns that cost them in their 22-8 loss.

Waller scored its first TD with only one second left in the second quarter to take a 8-0 first half lead. The Bulldogs extended the lead to 16-0 on a 38 yard run in the third quarter.

The Raiders put their first score on the board in the final period on a three yard run by Mickey Scott. Warren Hurd ran in for the extra points to put the Raiders in striking distance at 16-8. But with only seven seconds left in the game Waller wrapped up the win on a 44 yard touchdown run to take the 22-8 victory.

Depth played a key role in the game according to Raider coach Freddie Armstrong, noting the Raiders had only 13 players suited for the game while Waller had 45 players on its sideline.

Despite the loss the Raiders picked up 8 first downs while Waller only had six. The Raiders also recovered three Waller fumbles, two recoveries by Glen Leopold, but were unable to capitalize on the Bulldog mistakes.

Leading the Raiders offensively were Mickey Scott with 68 yards rushing, Warren Hurd with 41 and Kevin Dornak with 27. Top offensive players in the game, listed by Armstrong, were running back Scott, lineman Chad Miller and end David Schorierman.

8th Grade Losses The Raider eighth grade lost its game in the final two minutes of the game when a snap from center sailed out of the end zone for a safety, giving Waller an 8-6 victory. The Raiders took a 6-0 lead in the contest on a 31 yard TD pass from David

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Garwood-Sheridan Raiders Rally To Beat Louise 18 to 12 Last Thursday

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Waller "Bombs" Raiders 7-0 In District 22-AAA Opener

It was only the first game of the District 22AAA race; however, it may have crushed any hopes of winning the league crown for Rice High School as the spirited Waller Bulldogs "bombed" the favored Raiders 7-0 in a tremendous defensive battle before a capacity homecoming crowd last Friday night at Raider Stadium.

It was a 51 yard touchdown bomb by Waller with 4:07 left in the first quarter that decided the game between last season's District 22AAA co-champions.

Rice, seeking a post-season playoff spot, must now finish the rest of the season without a loss and hope the other league teams can knock each other off. Coaches warn, however, that if Waller continues to play as it did against Rice, they'll be tough to beat.

Except for that crucial pass play, the Raiders, ranked high in many areas and State polls, had the usual superb defensive effort but spluttered offensively with a total offense of just 56 yards.

"Our execution just wasn't real good," admitted a disappointed Raider Coach Clifford Darden. "Our blocking scheme just totally broke down." Darden indicated that the blocking problems weren't limited to the line, and gave Waller credit for having "one heck of a defensive line."

Despite that the "second year" Raider coach felt his team should have performed better.

"Waller didn't show us anything offensively or defensively that we weren't prepared for," said Darden. "I hate it that we let their (Waller) coaching staff out-work us. They got the most from their players."

The Waller players had a lot to give, too, in the first half, size, strength and quickness as evidenced on punt and kickoff coverages.

"When all 11 defensive players catch Ronnie Fry, you know they are quick," commented Darden.

Another big key, and maybe the "biggest key" according to Darden was the injury prior to the start of the game to running back Ed Thomas. The leading ground gainer in non-district play twisted his knee in a freak incident during pregame warmups and was only able to get in the game a couple of plays.

Thomas has been a big part of our offense all season and with him on the sideline we may have let down a little, and just didn't block as well," said Darden.

Thomas was also the Raider's starting safety and he was replaced by John Dawson. "Darden says that Dawson did a good job, but he had rather have him on the sideline talking offensive strategy rather than going both ways."

All things considered, the Raider offense was just not able to perform up to its non-district showing. The offense struggled for 22 rushing yards and managed to penetrate the Waller 20 yard line only once. Good size, strength and quickness were a factor in the initial period.

Johnson, the Raider fullback, carried 11 times for 19 yards in 11 carries.

Waller running back Craig Charleston led all rushers in the game with 61 yards in 13 carries.
