Through years of doing projects, members learn to select and follow pathways toward success in career development. 4-H pathways lead young people and their volunteer leaders to increased understanding, appreciation and service to people of the community, nation and the world.

National 4-H Photo Exhibition, supported by Eastman Kodak Company and featuring the works of nearly 200 4-H members, is exhibited annually at National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Ill. Both displays also are shown at 4-H and other events nationwide.

The 60th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 30-Dec. 3, 1981, provides recognition for some 1,700 youth delegates, selected as state, sectional or national winners in more than 50 4-H project areas. Private sector sponsors provide expense-paid trips to Chicago and more than \$265,000 in scholarships.

As the youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service of the State Land-Grant Universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 4-H reaches boys and girls in every county of the United States. Programs similar to 4-H also involve nearly 4.5 million youth in some 82 countries around the world.

In addition to financial support from federal, state and local governments, 4-H receives strong private support from thousands of businesses, corporations, foundations and individuals. At the national level, private support is channeled through National 4-H Council, making possible such activities as National 4-H Congress; citizenship and leadership programs at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C.; international exchanges; educational aids; publication of a magazine for leaders, NATIONAL 4-H NEWS; and incentives and recognition for 4-Hers.

Oil, Gas Completions In E.L. And Garwood Areas

New producers a mile east-southeast of Eagle Lake and another in the Speaks area highlight oil and gas activity in this county this week.

The No. 1 Ralph S. Fuller, Sr. et al has been completed by Gulfstream Petroleum in this county's Starlight gas field. The Houston operator reported that the well can make 1,887,000 cubic feet of natural gas per day on a 1.55-inch choke with an absolute open flow rating of 3,820,000 cubic feet per day. The well is bottomed at 9,760 feet and is producing from perforations from 9,541 to 9,548 feet in a 329 acre unit in the CTRR Survey east-southeast of Eagle Lake.

The other completion is the No. 1 Williams W. Allen, a natural gas producer 10 miles northeast of Speaks in Colorado County's Garwood Field. The well was drilled by Owl Petroleum Co. and showed potential for 186,000

cubic feet of gas per day on a 6.25-inch choke. The well entered a Miocene pay zone at 2,020 feet and was perforated to produce from 2,020 to 2,026 feet. The well is in a 229-acre lease in the E. S. Woolley Survey.

Another completion is reported in Louis Newitt, of Houston, No. 2 Raymond Korenek in a 384-acre lease in the L&GNRR Survey 3.5 miles southwest of Garwood.

The operator plans to reenter the well and complete production at 10,100 feet in the Buck Snag Field.

Owl Petroleum has also filed to drill a development well in the Garwood (Miocene) Field near Speaks on a 377-acre lease in the E. S. Woolley Survey. The new well will be the No. 3 Lena Balusek.
