Sue Briscoe Elected Treas. State CPA Bd.

Ms. Sue Briscoe, appointed by Governor Bill Clements to the Texas State Board of Public Accountants in November of 1979, was elected treasurer of the Board in September. She is the only woman serving on the board at the present time. Three new members are expected to be appointed this week.

Briscoe will be conducting CPA examinations on Nov. 4, 5 and 6 and has been recently asked to serve on the Board of Accountancy at the San Marcos Baptist Academy.

She attended the annual convention of the National Association of State Boards of Accountants in Hilton Head, South Carolina, Sept. 13-16 and then on September 23-26 she attended an accountants meeting when a friend of her's, Mrs. Caroline Russell, was installed as the National president of Women CPAs.

Weimar Voters OK \$3.8 Million School Bond Issue

Voters in the Weimar Independent School District voted 682 to 193 in a special election last Saturday to approve \$3.8 million in bonds for the construction of a new high school facility.

The bond issue was approved by the voters after the high school was threatened with the loss of accreditation. The building to be replaced is sixty years old.

The heavy turnout was accredited to the good weather and to the fact that the Weimar school board had held an intensive information campaign in support of the issue.

At the same time, the voters approved the increase of the school district's tax rate from 46c to 99c per \$100 valuation in order to finance the project.

The board is expected to move quickly as possible to sell the bonds and to accept bids for the construction and hopes are that construction contracts can be let in January of 1982.

Two Universal Studio trucks pulled up behind the State Capitol last week, causing quite a stir among office staff experiencing a lull in political gales.

The trucks carried equipment for shooting a sequence of "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas," a play about former Gov. Dolph Briscoe's closing of the famed La Grange institution.

Scheduled for filming this week is the scene where the villain pounds on the Governor's office door, demanding to know why the brothel remains open for business.

The filming comes at an appropriate time when new legislators are back home making a living and many state officials are out pounding the bushes for future

political races.

Except for the motion picture connection, Capitol halls are strangely quiet as officials seek to renew their ties with "the people."

For elected officials, these autumn months are crucial because the political soundings and readings provide a basic shape of next year's general election and primary ballots.

In the governor's race, incumbent Republican Bill Clements has indicated he will seek re-election and will formally announce in the near future.

Locking to win the Democratic primary are Briscoe, Tyler State Sen. Peyton McKnight, and Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong. Briscoe is said to be still making up his mind, while McKnight is

out beating the bushes across the state for support.

Armstrong said last week he fully expects to get in the race and may make his announcement this month. After asking around and getting no "negative" feedback, he will file this week so he can raise money.

His moderate candidacy may well force either Briscoe or McKnight out of the race to avoid splitting the conservative vote.

LI Governor

Texas Secretary of State George Strake was expected to announce sometime this week he would seek the post of lieutenant governor, now held by Bill Hobby.

Hobby sat quiet about his intentions during the regular and special sessions, but now he is out mustering support among Democrats.

No primary opponent is forecast now.

As a state official, Hobby is said to be hardworking, but dull. A recent hunting story now going around, and which Hobby sometimes tells on himself, certainly changes that image somewhat.
