Accurate Medical Records Are Important!!

Medical Records Week Oct. 18 - 24

Someone enters the hospital, his health problem is diagnosed by a doctor and treatment is planned. The patient will receive nursing care and may have tests and treatment procedures performed. The patient's medical record contains complete and authenticated reports from members of the professional staff who have a part in the patient's care: doctors, nurses, laboratory personnel, dietitians and many more.

An accurate and permanent document can help insure accurate diagnoses and treatments; not only of the present health problems but also of future problems which may bring the patient back to a health care facility. Medical records also verify insurance claims for the patient and they have legal value.

Medical records are used by doctors to study results of treatment by other physicians. Valuable medical research on currently incurable diseases often begins with information from medical records. Impersonal statistics from medical records are used for purposes of planning future hospital needs and effective public health programs as deemed necessary by the study of health conditions and disease patterns in the community.

The Medical Record Department has become an important information center and the American Medical Record Association (AMRA) is always providing top-quality ways to gather information.

The purpose of AMRA is to promote the art and science of the medical record professions. These professionals have specialized knowledge about all types of health care records, whether the records be for hospitals, clinics, nursing homes or other health facilities.

Active membership in AMRA is available to Registered Record Administrators (RRA), and Accredited Record Technicians (ART). The responsibilities of the RRA are administrative: developing medical record systems for health care facilities in order to meet standards of accreditation and regulatory agencies; collecting and analyzing patient care data; developing policies and procedures for medico-legal uses of records; and acting as a consultant to various facilities.

ART responsibilities include supervision of day-to-day operations of a Medical Record Department; reviewing records for completeness and accuracy; coding of data for retrieval uses; transcribing medical reports; and maintenance and use of indexes for research and study.

The Texas Medical Association is celebrating Texas Medical Record Week during

October 18-24th. During that week, Texas is hosting the annual convention of the American Medical Record Association in San Antonio. Various members of the Medical Record Technology program at Wharton County Junior College will be attending this convention.

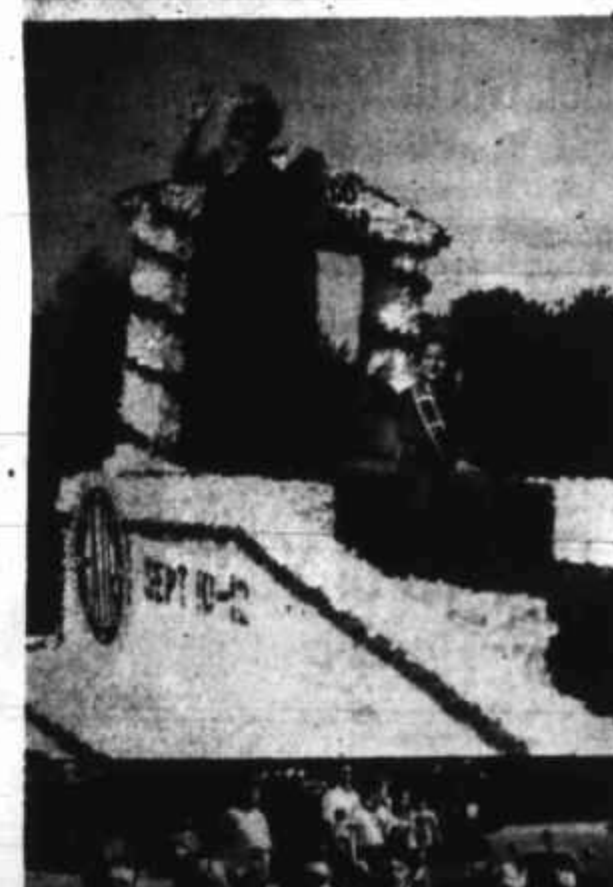
