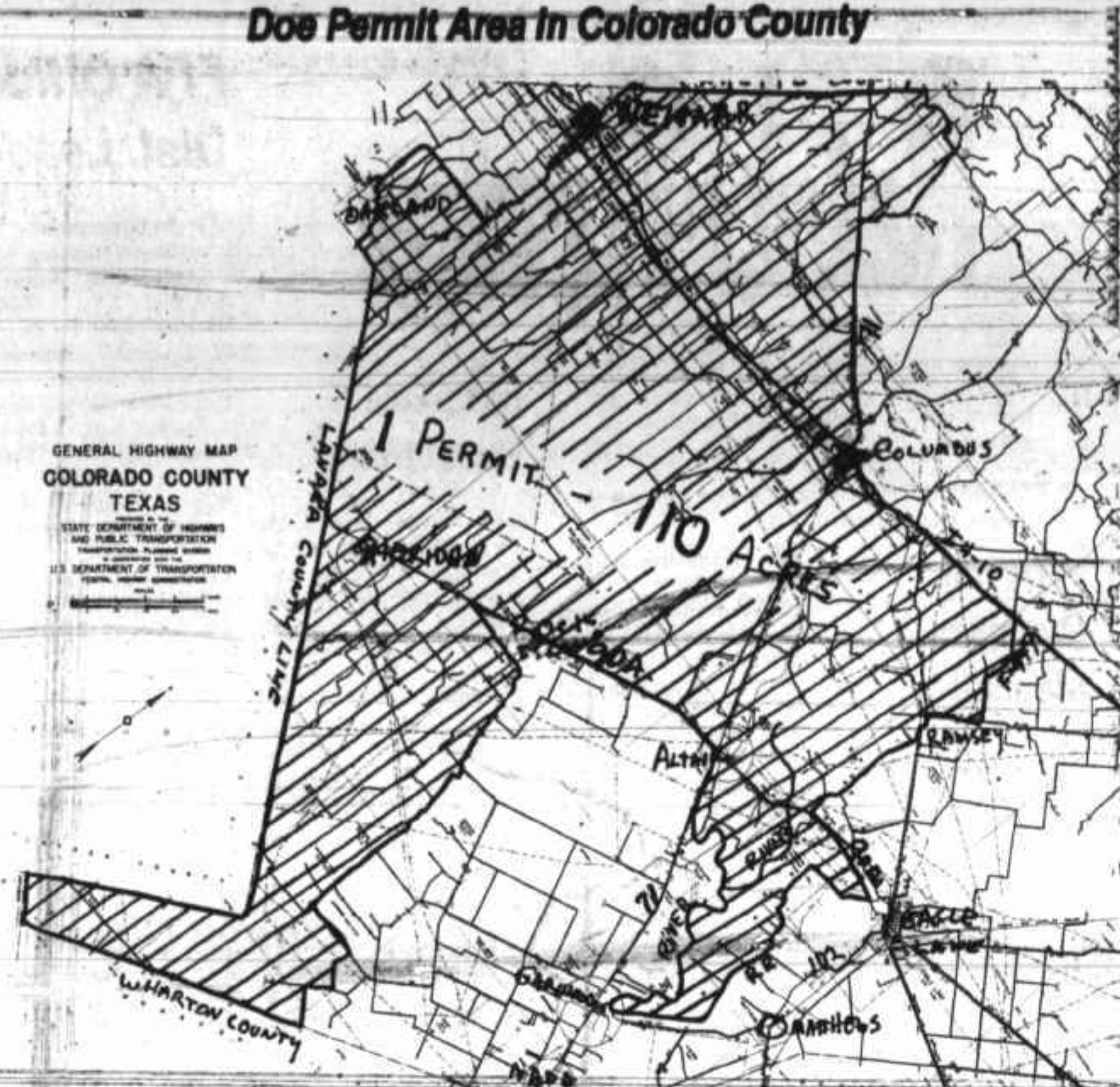

Doe Permits Issued In County Nov. 12-13

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless (doe) permits for Colorado County in the County Courthouse in Columbus from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Thursday and Friday, Nov. 12th and 13th.

See the map above for the permit designated area in this county.

For the issuance of doe permits in Colorado County this year, there is only one designated area in which permits will be issued on the basis of one for each 110 acres. Biologists note that the landowner must have at least 110 acres for the first permit and after that one over half of the designated number or more for additional permits.

The 1961 season will begin on Nov. 14th with a limit of three deer but only one in the designated area if the hunter has in possession a doe.

Once Was Enough...

The Raider football team was glad that Coach Darden didn't say a whole lot during this week's practices about the nine fumbles they lost in their contest against Belville. Seems they heard all they could stand last Friday night.

"Of course everybody was disappointed with the first half mistakes," said Darden, adding, "I didn't say much about it to the kids this week. I think I dwelled on it enough at halftime."

Darden admits that the fumbles were plentiful in the

Where Are They?

Darden used a little psychological strategy going into the Belville contest that may have given the Raiders a little edge. Rice didn't show up at the football field until a few minutes before kickoff.

"It was their homecoming," said Darden, "and there was all sorts of program activities going on that I felt were going to be distracting to us and spirit builders for them."

The Raiders warmed up at a practice field next to the high school and then drove to the field in town just in time for the opening kickoff.

"I was hoping that Belville would think that we weren't taking the game too seriously and that us not being there would take a little edge off the enthusiasm they had built," explained Darden. "It was something different for the kids to experience and they seemed to really be fired up when we arrived at the stadium."

Though Rob Johnson, John Dawson and Darryl Hinz were elected to serve as captains, coach Darden had to find someone else to represent the Raiders for the flip of the coin prior to the kickoff since the players wouldn't be there yet. Chosen for the honorable duty were four people who Darden says may be the "hardest workers" on the team. They were the Raider trainers and managers, including David Adams, Richard Gartman, Ronald Godino and Ricky Toliver.

Fumble Fever...

Coach Darden is not one to make any predictions about the upcoming football games. However, in his weekly conference with him on the phone prior to the Belville game he gave me a pretty good indication of what might happen and I didn't even know it at the time.

"I won't say that he knew it either," after all, how can anyone predict his team will fumble as many times as Rice did against the Brahmas. Anyhow, when I asked him what to expect from the Raiders against Belville, his reaction was a dead giveaway...he dropped the phone."

In case you're wondering, Darden seemed to have a good grip on the phone this week when talking about the Brahmas. He did warn, however, that the Raiders are not taking the Cougars lightly.

"We know that Brazos hasn't won a league game in

two seasons and that they haven't scored a point in district play so far this year," said Darden. "But we're not going to take them lightly...you never can tell what might happen."

Brazos has a lot of sophomores in its starting line up and is building for the future. They have already shown some promise, winning their three non-district games and only losing to Sealy 3-0 and Belville 13-0.

The Cougars are coming off a bitter 49-0 loss to Columbus last week and with the thought of a 64-0 loss to Rice last season lingering in their minds, they could give the Raiders a pretty tough time.

Raiders Lose Nine Fumbles But Beat Bellville 19-6 Last Wk.

Despite turning the ball over on eight of their nine first half possessions, the Rice Raiders managed a 6-0 half-time score and then added two second half field goals by James Rhodes and a punt return by Ronnie Fry for a touchdown to escape with a 19-6 victory over the Belville Brahmas.

The win in Belville upped the Raiders' District 22AAA record to 2-2 and their season mark to 5-2. The Brahmas fall to 1-3 and 3-4 overall.

Only a sparkling defensive performance by coach Clifton Darden's Rampaging Raiders kept the game from getting away as it allowed a negative 28 yards rushing in the contest and just 61 yards passing. The Raider defense was again led by linebacker Dwayne Pagel with 13 tackles which included three costly sacks. Linemen James Rhodes and Kenneth Bluntson and safety Darryl Hinz

each had one sack in the game to contribute to the punishing defensive effort by Rice.

The Raiders' lone first half tally came on its only error-free drive in the opening half when halfback Kenneth Hemphill broke through the right side of the line and dashed 44 yards to the end zone. The missed extra point left the Raiders with a 6-0 lead with 4:06 remaining in the first quarter of play.

Belville knotted the score in the final seconds of the half following the Raiders' most critical mistake of the game. Pushed deep into their own territory the Raiders were attempting to punt but a bad snap from center led to a Belville recovery on the two yard line despite a desperate effort by punter Rob Johnson to get the kick away.

On the next play Brahmas quarterback Chip Seals

passed to end Freddie Benjamin for Rhodes, who pointed by Rhodes, this one from 25 yards out for a 12-6 lead. The drive started on their own 36 with the kick coming on the eleventh play of the march with 8:48 left in the final period.

Though controlling the Brahmas offense, the Raiders did not wrap up the win until 33 seconds remained in the game.

Belville, facing a fourth and 23 deep in its own territory, elected to punt and the low, short kick was fumbled by Fry and he raced down the sideline for a 38-yard touchdown return. Rhodes kicked the extra point to put Rice out of reach at 19-6.

Darryl Hinz ended any hopes of Belville narrowing the gap as he intercepted a Brahmas pass with just 12 seconds remaining.
