Patman Says People Win First Round In Interest Rate Battle

The people have won the first round in the Capitol Hill battle to keep interest rates down!

After two days of subcommittee hearings, Congressmen Patman succeeded Tuesday, Oct. 20 in tabling H. R. 2501, the Interest Rate Regulation Bill—a bill Congressmen Patman has called the "Loan Shark Revitalization Act of 1981."

Patman noted throughout his 20 years in the Texas Senate for his many success

ful fights against high interest rates—warned that "the selfish forces behind this bill are working day and night. It can still be revised in committee or on the House floor. It could even be slipped in as an amendment to more comprehensive legislation."

Federal Water Pollution Act Can Hurt Movement To Sunbelt

Clean air, healthy economies and abundant natural resources have attracted record numbers of people to the sunbelt states in the past few years.

But those same states will suffer if the federal Water Pollution Control Act of 1981 comes out of Congress in the same form in which it has been introduced. Water, and water needs in the future, have emerged as some of the most crucial questions facing sunbelt residents, especially Texans.

The Water Act, expected to come up in the House of Representatives this week, is a perfect example of how thoughtless budget-cutting by bureaucrats not familiar with local problems could end up costing the taxpayers more money in the long-run, instead of less, we're all for

cutting back the federal budget—and in fact, I've taken the lead among my colleagues in calling for more restrained fiscal policy. The idea, though, is not just to slash away like a samurai, but to seek out areas of waste, duplication, and over-regulation, to streamline the programs and make them more efficient, saving what is best.

Right now, the government steps in to help cities build sewage treatment plants and water control systems that meet federal standards for pollution control.

There are some problems with the program, like too much red tape. But the idea is a solid one, and though cuts can be made here, too, they must be thoughtful cuts and not false economies. The government loans and grants money to small towns—like

Governor Supports Amend. 4

Governor Bill Clements warned Texans that defeat of Amendment No. 4 in the general election on November 3 could lead to higher taxes in the future.

Clements made the remarks at a meeting of Water for Texas Committee, a statewide organization of prominent leaders who are backing the amendment, which would provide a plan for setting aside a "nest egg" from the state's budget surplus to help finance water projects.

The governor was responding to published claims of some opponents that passage of the amendment "will lead to higher taxes down the road."

"The truth of the matter is, Texans are more likely to face increased taxes if we don't pass Amendment No. 4," Clements declared. "That's simply because the surplus will be frittered away every two years with the help of some lawmakers opposing Amendment No. 4, and we'll end up facing a water crisis down the road that people will demand we take care of, even if it does mean a tax increase."

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Rep. Saunders Praises Exten. Service At Information Day

Get "Women Year" Awards

Colorado County Extension Information Day was held at the Extension Service Center Monday with an array of educational exhibits and a variety of delicious foods, an interesting program featuring State Representative Robert Saunders of La Grange as the principal speaker, and informative and educational exhibits, a bazaar and a bread fair.

The day's activities got underway at 9:00 a.m. with singing of the delicious foods of all kinds prepared by the members of the Extension Homemakers Clubs of the county. Mrs. Dorothy White Garwood, former Rice High School home economics teacher, and Tom Northrup of New Ulm and Houston, chairman of the Colorado County Fair, served as judges and awarded many red and white ribbons. A complete list of these winners will be published next week.

The Colorado County Program Building Information Day started at 11:30 a.m. with a welcome by John Engstrom of Garwood, chairman of the rice and soybean committee. Mrs. Bernice Johnson of Freiburg, chairman of the program building committee, served as emcee of the ceremony. She expressed appreciation to all who came to attend the day's activities and to those who made other contributions toward making the event so great a success.

Lucien LaCourse of the Colorado County Sheriff's department, led in the pledge to the flag; after which Monsignor Victor Schmidt, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church in La Grange, gave the invocation. A bountiful buffet meal followed in which everyone had an opportunity to sample all of the wide variety of delicious foods prepared by the extension homemakers.

Brenda Burford of Columbus, 4-H and Youth Chairman, introduced the special guests for the occasion: Extension officials, county and city officials, representatives of financial institutions, the press and the county fair association; as well as other Extension program building committee members.

Touches Many Lives County Judge Lester J. Anek introduced the guest speaker, Representative Robert Saunders. Judge Crane presented some of the outstanding accomplishments by members in his first term in the Legislature. "He has been in the interest of the rural Texas and

promises to become one of the area's most outstanding representatives," noted Judge Crane.

Rep. Saunders praised the work of the Extension Service and pledged his full support to the program in the future. "The Extension Service is the biggest information center in our state," he commented. "It is a matter of record that dollars spent in support of the Extension Service have produced a greater harvest of returns than for any other agency."

He praised all who worked in the program and said, "They make it work." He discussed the thrust for the 80's, theme of which is "People Helping People."

He discussed the six challenges included in the thrust for the 80's program, namely, increased emphasis on soil and water conservation; increased emphasis on fuel conservation; increased understanding of marketing and farm policies; increased educational programs on cutting input costs in production of agricultural products; sophisticated management of agriculture and agribusiness; and the development of talents and leadership skills.

He noted that Texas ranks third in the nation in sales of agricultural products, trailing only California and Iowa. Texas does lead in many areas of production of agricultural products and emphasized that programs carried on by the Extension Service and further research and technology could move Texas to the top in agricultural production.

Education is important. Saunders told the gathering that "education is an important part of the Extension Service, for all ages." He stressed that "with courage and team work agriculture will continue to prosper in Texas."

Awards Presented Mrs. Dorothy White of Menta, Extension Homemakers Council Chairperson, announced winners of the "Women of the Year" Awards and they received certificates of accomplishment presented by Rep. Saunders.

The winners of the outstanding awards were: Cathy Leopold of Nalda's Celler Door Club; Fay Elliott of Columbus Club; Bernice Hainsohn of Freiburg Club; Marie Brune of Shaw Bend

Club; and Dorothy Wicks of Menta Club.

Closing remarks by Mrs. Heinsohn ended the program.

From 1:30 to 5:00 p.m. visitors were treated to tours of educational exhibits and these were followed by a Holiday Workshop and Bazaar. Many beautiful handmade items were offered for sale, as well as many delicious home-baked items.

Workshops held: a streeled demonstration, fabric pictures frame demonstration, holiday strawbery preserves demonstration; a demonstration on how to decorate a child's room and a child's tree for the holidays; and a youth projects demonstration and another on spice bags and its uses.
