"Tenorex '81"

"Tenorex '81" was simulated operational readiness exercise conducted simultaneously in New Orleans and Houston using a computer-programmed shipboard simulator. The exercise involved selected reservists from Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida, and tested their abilities to augment Naval ships in the event of a national emergency.

The exercise was made highly realistic through the use of shipboard simulators in Houston and New Orleans. Duplications of actual departments aboard a ship, the simulators included the bridge, combat information center, propulsion, radio central, and damage control departments. Through the use of a central computer, these departments were fed various emergencies and the crew was expected to react in the same manner as if they were at sea. At the conclusion of the exercise, all crews were graded and ranked.

A 1962 graduate of Garwood High School and a 1966 graduate of the University of Texas, Austin, with a bachelor of arts degree, Engstrom joined the Navy in June 1965.

Graveside Rites Held In Houston For John Bisson

Last rites were held at 3:00 p.m. Friday, Oct. 30th at Forest Park Lawndale Cemetery in Houston for John Daniel Bisson of Rock Island, Mr. Bisson died at around 2:30 a.m. Thurs., Oct. 29th of a heart attack.

He was born May 16, 1919 in Garden City, New Jersey the son of Francis and Agnes White Bisson. He lived for 25 years in Bellaire before moving to Rock Island three years ago after retiring from Southern Pacific Railroad. He was an ICC inspector and diesel electrician for Southern Pacific.
