

Disabled American Veterans... They Paid the Price for Peace!



ABOUT THE ARTIST: George L. Skyppek, a survivor of two tours of combat duty in Vietnam, has become one of the nation's foremost artists in depicting the experiences of soldiers in war. Greatest impetus for Skyppek's subject material comes from his personal combat impressions, especially those associated with friends wounded, killed or missing. "Memories forged in the heat of combat, refined by the pain of wounds, and sustained by the alienation of our society cannot be forgotten," says Skyppek. His distinctive combat art has been displayed extensively, including a special exhibit in the rotunda of the U.S. House of Representatives. He is currently studying under a scholarship at the Corcoran School of Art, Washington, D.C. Skyppek served as a special warfare advisor to South Vietnamese forces in the Mekong Delta region and later as a senior intelligence officer. He was released from active duty as a captain and holds numerous decorations, including the Purple Heart, Air Medal and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry.

Time For Remembering

The screams of the wounded and the stench of gunpowder surrounded Robert Richardson, a private in America's Continental Army, but he fought on until a British cannonball struck his hand. He broke in two, one end tearing his belly open. The wind from the cannonball hit his right arm useless. Richardson's blood had paid the price of peace and freedom. But, for the rest of his life, he was totally disabled.

For a while, the Continental Congress provided the Revolutionary War veteran a disability pension of half his military salary. It helped, but Richardson was unable to support himself on this meager allowance. Even this pittance ended shortly after the War of Independence when the new national government turned responsibility for disabled veterans over to the individual states and their poor law systems.

Life was tough—really tough—for Richardson and other patriots wounded in the struggle to free America from colonial chains. Many were reduced to begging. Things are better for the 2½ million disabled veterans living in today's America. But on Veterans Day this year, it's appropriate to recall what happened to the disabled veterans of our Revolution.

War. What happened to them established a pattern that has, to some extent, been played out after each of our country's nine wars—a pattern of forgetfulness that playing itself out again today, just six years after the last American was killed in Vietnam, our most recent war.

Perhaps that understandable. When wars end, people want to get back to normal, peacetime life, leaving the turmoil and anxiety of war behind. Following the Vietnam War—the most unpopular war in our nation's history with the single exception of the Civil War—the process of forgetting has been unparallelly rapid. People want to bury

Workshop And Bazaar
An outstanding Holiday Recipe shared by the Family Living Committee members during the workshop was: Microwave Fruitcake ½ cup soft butter 6 T. dark brown sugar 3 T. corn syrup or honey 6 eggs ½ cup flour ½ t. salt 1 t. baking powder 1 t. nutmeg 1 t. allspice ½ cup brandy or rum 1½ cups each red and green candied cherries 6 cups coarsely chopped walnuts or pecans

In large mixing bowl, cream butter, brown sugar and corn syrup. Add eggs, one at a time, beating continuously. Blend with flour, salt, baking powder, nutmeg and allspice until smooth. Stir in walnuts, fold in cherries and nuts. Pour into 12-cup bundt pan. Microwave (High) 10-14 minutes, rotating ¼ turn every 4 minutes. Rest 15-20 minutes before loosening. Invert from pan. Glaze if desired. Makes 1 large cake.

October's fed slaughter cattle didn't roll over and play dead but their pulse was weak. Sixty-three cents was about all fed steers in Texas panhandle. Feedlots could muster as the month ended.

Tightening fed cattle numbers in the future will help fed cattle prices turn around. On October first cattle on feed were down 9 percent with placements of 11 percent, compared to a year ago, according to the recent USDA Cattle on Feed Report. The on feed figure was the lowest in the 23 major feeding states since July of 1975.

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New Oil, Gas Locations At Garwood, Lissie

New oil and gas drilling locations in the Lissie and southwest Garwood areas and a completion in the Freiburg Field highlight oil and gas activity in this county this week.

The new location at Lissie is a 9,850-wireless well by Golden Oil Corp. of Houston one mile west of Lissie in Wharton County. The location is in a 613-acre lease in the A. J. Fry Survey and is the No. 1 Earl Poole et al in the Lissie Wilcox Field.

Scorpion Exploration Co. of Aliso will drill the No. 1 Ben Huvor and wife three miles southwest of Garwood in this county. The well, in a 92-acre lease in the H.M. Johnson and B. F. Stafford Surveys, is projected to 7,000 feet.

Armada Resources of Houston has filed for a permit to plugback the No. 1 A-6 Lehigh five miles west of Garwood for a shallower completion in the area of 5,920 feet. The well is in a 163-acre lease in the I&GNRR Survey.

The completion in the Freiburg Field in the No. 1 Warsaw drilled to 10,715 feet but completed from perforations from 9,203 to 9,209 feet. The well was rated at 681,000 cubic feet per day on a 1.25 inch choke and had absolute open flow of 875,000 cubic feet per day. The site is in the W. Hunt Survey two miles northwest of Freiburg.

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Firemen Are Called To Three Alarms

Eagle Lake Volunteer Firemen were called to three alarms during the past week, one of which destroyed a playhouse at the Richard Clipson home on Laughlin Road.
