

Deer Season Opens Saturday

Limit Of One Buck In This County

Hundreds of deer hunters from far and wide will pour into this and adjoining counties for the opening of the 1981 deer hunting season this Saturday, Nov. 14th. The deer will be legal targets through Sunday, Jan. 3rd, 1982.

The deer are expected to be in good shape with an excellent acorn crop due to heavy rains this summer and fall.

In Colorado County the limit is three deer, but the limit may include only one buck and a spike deer is considered as a buck deer. The other deer may be antlerless or doe deer but the antlerless deer may be killed only if the hunter has in his or her possession a permit issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The permit will be issued this Thursday and Friday in a county courthouse and in a designated area on the county on the basis of one permit to 110 acres.

The limits are the same in the neighboring counties of Austin, Lavaca and Fayette; but in Wharton County the limit is three deer, two of which may be bucks.

Legal shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Deer hunters should also note that:

- A resident license, costing \$5.75 is required of all Texas citizens who hunt outside of the county of their residence.
- Persons hunting on land where they reside, or certain disabled veterans, may hunt deer if they possess a \$1.25 Resident Exempt Hunting license. A combination fishing and hunting license, costing \$8.75, meets the deer hunting requirements.
- Dogs may not be used to hunt deer.
- All deer must be tagged immediately upon being killed with the tag provided on the resident license or exempt license and the tag must be properly filled out and marked and punched and securely attached to the carcass.
- Any deer killed by one

person and in the possession of another must have all necessary tags and permits attached and signed by the person who killed the animal. Any portion of an animal given to another person must have attached a legible document signed by the person who killed the animal, stating his name, address, date of kill, hunting license number and the name of the county and ranch where the kill was made.

Fair Kill Anticipated
Parks and Wildlife Dept. biologists state that hunters should find deer "fairly plentiful" in this area and in good shape. Last year's kill was well below normal and it is hoped that this year's kill will be much better. They add there appears to have been a good fawn crop and a good carryover from the 1980 population.

Legislation To Remove County From State Controls Failed
Citizens of the county petitioned State Representative Robert Saunders and Sen. Kent Caperton to remove the county's deer hunting program from control of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. controls, but the legislation failed passage in the last Legislature.

Over 700 landowners and other interested persons petitioned the Commissioners' Court to take the deer out from under the state program and the Commissioners' Court concurred and requested Rep. Saunders and Sen. Caperton to enter bills to that effect.

The bill, however, failed to pass, mainly due to the position and opposition of Governor Bill Clements. Gov. Clements went on record as opposing any changes taking any wildlife out from under control of the Parks and Wildlife Dept. According to Rep. Saunders, "the governor believes that we have a good system going all over the state and wants to keep it that way."

Some reduction in the doe permit areas have been approved by the Parks and Wildlife biologists this year.

A hearing held on the proposed legislation was held last May and some landowners and members of the Commissioners' Court and Judge Lester Cranek testified at the hearing in support of the bill, but apparently the governor's opposition prevented passage of the bill.

"Even if we did not pass the bill, we made them (P&WD) more aware of the problems and I think we can deal with it," added Rep. Saunders.

These changes in the trespassing law became effective September 1, 1981.

Trespassing Law Changed In Texas

With the approach of hunting season in Texas, both property owners and sportsmen should be aware of recent changes in state law regarding trespassing, reminds the Texas Farmers Union.

A person has committed criminal trespass if he has entered or remains on property or in a building and was notified that entry was forbidden or received notice and failed to leave the premises.

The law states the notice can be any oral or written communication from a property owner or a person who is acting under the owner's authority. Also, any fence which is designed to contain livestock is described under Texas law as a notice to a potential trespasser.

Persons who violate the trespassing law are subject to a Class B misdemeanor if found guilty. However, if a person carries a deadly weapon in his possession and found guilty of trespassing, that violation is elevated to a Class A misdemeanor.

These changes in the trespassing law became effective September 1, 1981.

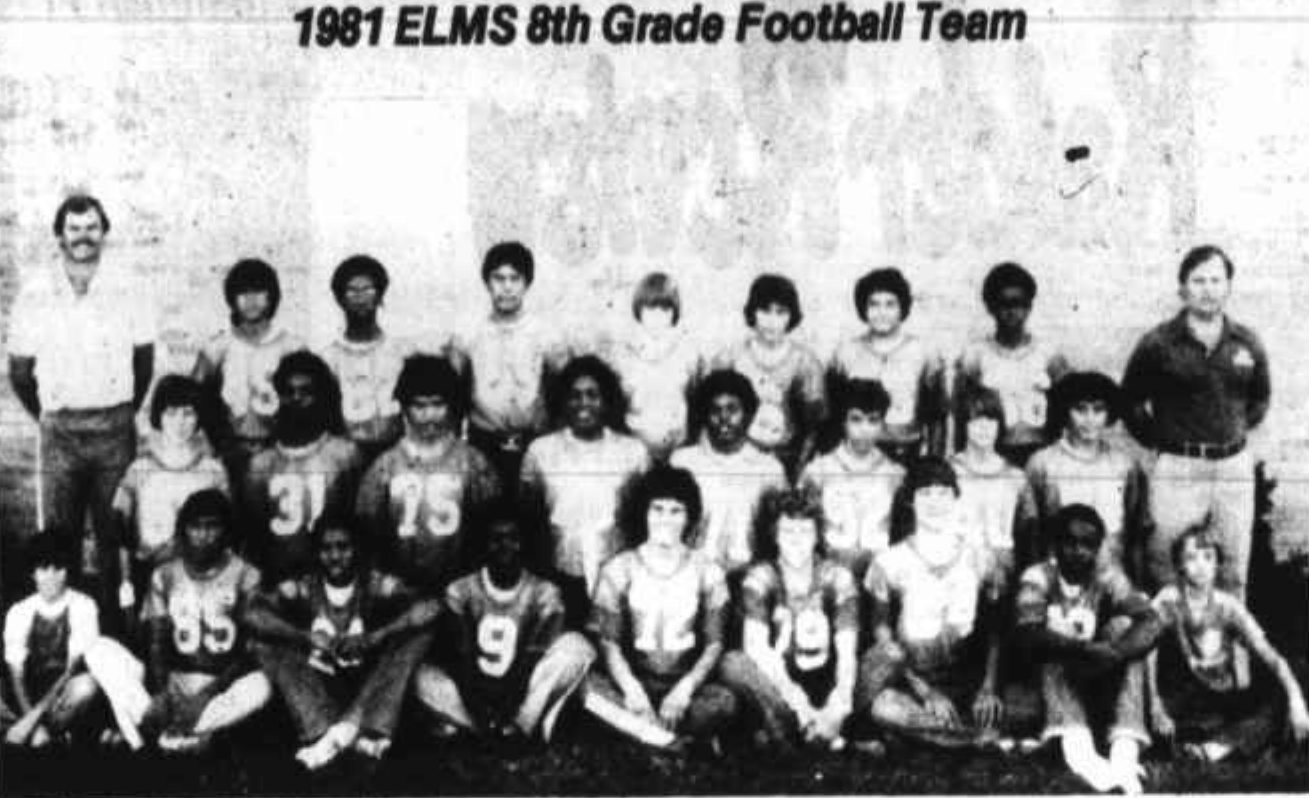

Rice Shoots Down Cards 17-6; End Season Hosting E.B. Fri.

Parent's Night Activities Scheduled To Start At 7 P.M.

While hundreds of sportsmen were pouring into the area on the eve of the goose and duck hunting season, the Rice Raiders had already begun doing some bird hunting of their own as they shot down the Columbus Cardinals 17-6 in a District 22AAA football battle last Friday night in Columbus.

Although the Raider offense was not exactly on target, the Redbirds proved to be easy prey as their special teams made two costly mistakes that resulted in both touchdowns scored by Rice. The win ups the Raider district record to 4-2 and their season mark to 7-2. The loss makes the Cards 3-2-1 in district and 6-2-1 overall.

This Friday night the Raiders will wind up their season hosting the high-scoring East Bernard Brahmas at Raider Stadium in Altair beginning at 7:30 p.m. Parents of the varsity players are asked to be at the stadium by 6:45. Also during the evening, parents of the junior varsity, sophomore and freshman teams as well as parents of ELMS and the Garwood-Sheridan football players, will be recognized in the stands.

Last Friday it took a little luck for the Raiders to get by the Cards, but according to Raider coach Clifton Darden, that is all part of the game.

"It always takes some kind of break to open up a game," said Darden, "and many times, even in the pro ranks, one little mistake can make the difference. I also believe that the good teams make their own breaks. Our kids played exceptionally well and hit hard and the Columbus players were not there to play. We put the pressure

on them and forced them to make the costly turnovers." Turnovers, which have plagued the Raiders for much of this season, apparently rubbed off on the high-flying Redbirds last Friday night as they lost four fumbles and were intercepted once. The mistakes proved to be the difference in the game as the opportunistic Raiders made the most of the miscues.

The problems started for the Cards the first time they got a chance to get the ball. The Columbus defense held the Raiders after the opening kickoff, but on the short punt by Rob Johnson, an unsuspecting Cardinal blocker was touched by the ball and Rice recovered on the Birds' 28 yard line. On the very next play, halfback Kenneth Hemphill took a pitch from quarterback John Dawson and raced around right end for a 28 yard touchdown run with 10:01 remaining in the first period of play. James Rhodes added the extra point and the 7-0 score stood up for the remainder of the first half.

The Cards attempted a 26 yard field goal in the closing seconds of the first half but a bad snap kept them from getting the kick away.

Rice Mistake Also Costly
The Raiders fumbled only once in the game, but that mistake eventually led to a Cardinal touchdown. In the third quarter, Columbus took over at its own 35 and marched 64 yards in six plays with Woodward Toliver and Doug Stovall taking turns carrying the ball. On first down on the one quarterback Ricky Nooka tried a keeper up the middle but the Raider defense did not budge. On second down he tried again and was jarred loose from the ball but after a long scramble for the ball in the end zone, the referees finally signaled a touchdown with Nooka getting credit for the score.

The Rambling Rice (R.R.) Raiders will host the East Bernard Brahmas in the season finale at Raider Stadium this Friday in Altair starting at 7:30 p.m.

E.B. will be relying, as usual, on the talent of their highly touted running back J.B. Scott who has already rushed for over 1500 yards this season. His biggest game being a 266 yard performance against Hempstead.
