number of directors as needed.

In passing the motion Judge Crane and the commissioners emphasized that the formation of the industrial development foundation does not in any way obligate the county for any bonds issued.

The formation of the foundation and the issuance of bonds on the tax-exempt status was made possible in legislation passed in this state in recent years. "Texas was the 43rd state to adopt such legislation, so this is not something new," noted Judge Crane.

"The real purpose of the foundation is to enable the sale of bonds on an income tax exempt status. Bonds sold will have to be approved by the foundation officers, the commissioners' court and the Texas Industrial Commission thus assuring ample opportunity to approve or

reject the bonds if the industrial project involved is not satisfactory," concluded the judge.

\$100 Reward Offered For Info On Malicious Mischief

Eagle Lake Police Chief Earl Weinbrenner was called Tuesday morning to investigate a case of malicious mischief at the Wintermann and Company bulk fertilizer facility off Beaks Avenue.

Entry was made into the office of the facility by crawling onto the roof, removing a door and then the vandals slid down a rope into the fertilizer area. They apparently used a crowbar to completely remove a window into the office of the building after an attempt to break out the plexiglass window failed.

Once in the office the vandals used paint to write obscene messages and sprayed the paint over a calculator and a computer which is used to accurately mix the fertilizer blends.

Workers of Wintermann and Company were busy Tuesday cleaning up the mess. Chief Weinbrenner continues the investigation.

Wintermann and Company has posted a \$100 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for the malicious mischief. If you have information you can
