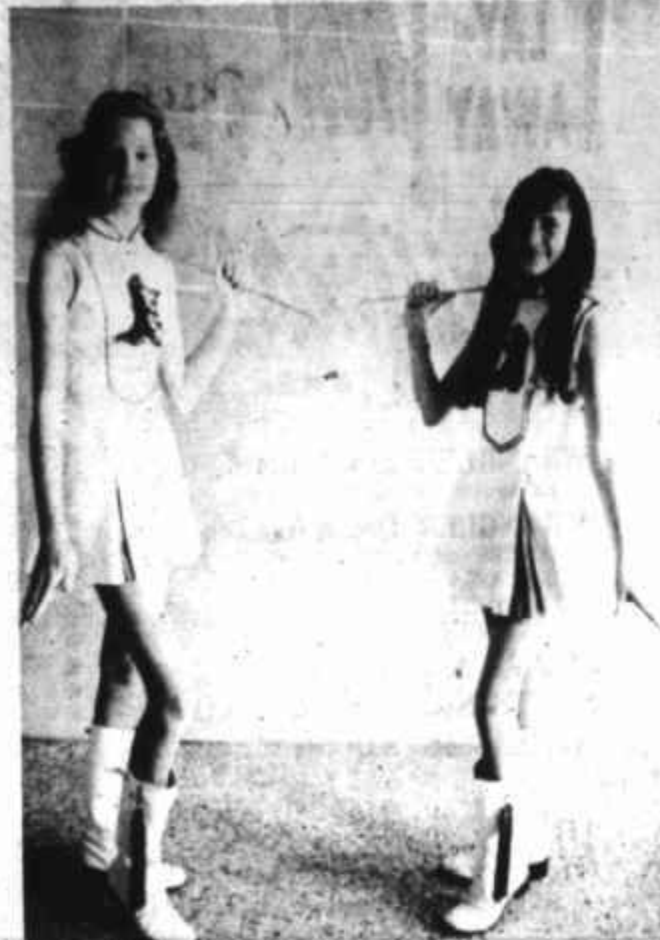

Steel Shot Regs. Stand Up In Court

The regulation banning the use of toxic lead shot shells for waterfowl hunting in all or portions of six counties in Southeast Texas has withstood a courtroom challenge and will be enforced during the waterfowl hunting season which started in that region Nov. 7.

State District Judge Peter Lowry of Austin ruled in favor of the regulation which is designed to reduce the incidence of lead poisoning of waterfowl. Hunters within the nontoxic shot zone will

East Bernard Slips By Raider JV 6-0

The 1981 football season came to a close last Thursday night for the Rice Raider junior varsity as it lost to the East Bernard Brahma 6-0 in East Bernard.

The Raiders, coached by Gil Stalbaum and Maurice Gindrat, wind up the year with a 3-5-1 record.

The lone score in last week's game came in the final minute of the first half with the Brahma sneaking on an 11 yard option play. The score was set up three plays earlier when East Bernard completed a 20 yard pass on a fourth down and three situation. A saving tackle by Andy Anderson was all for nothing though as the Brahma had a first and ten from the 10 and scored three plays later.

The Raider defense played well in the second half also but Rice was unable to overcome the first half deficit and the Brahma took the 6-0 win.

East Bernard managed a pair of grueling, time-consuming drives in the second half and Rice only had one possession in the third quarter and just two in the final stanza.

Leading the Raider of fense in the contest was Mel Pratt with 34 yards in seven carries with two coming on quarterback sneaks for 16 and 10 yards. He also completed six of fourteen passes for 27 yds. two to Michael Davis and one to Delbert Jarvis.

Defensive standouts included Davis with 11 tackles, Lanyon and Jarvis with eight each.

Garwood-Sheridan Raiders Lose Final Game To Lexington

Open Basketball Season This Thurs.

The Garwood-Sheridan Raiders closed out their 1981 football season last Thursday night, losing to the Lexington Eagles 36-0 in Lexington. In a "B" team scrimmage prior to the game the Raiders were outscored 3 to 0.

The Raiders, coached by Bennie Machac and Mike Michalka, ended the 1981 football campaign on a disappointing note last week and one that was indicative of the season.

"The kids did just about all we asked of them all year long," said coach Michalka. "But we were outscored almost every time we went on the field and that usually had a big role in the outcome of the game. be required to possess and use only nontoxic steel loads in all gauges of shotguns when waterfowl hunting.

The suit, brought by the Muldoon Hunting and Fishing Club of Clute, charged that the nontoxic shot rule discriminated against hunters in one section of the state by requiring the use of steel loads, while hunters in the remainder of the state could continue to use lead shot.

Department biologists testified at court hearings that several thousand geese from waterfowl ducks from the taken area were found to have a relatively high ingestion rate of lead shot ingestion.

Waterfowl In Texas Pass Endrin Test

Laboratory examination of 100 wild ducks collected in the Texas Panhandle revealed no residues of the pesticide Endrin, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

Discovery of Endrin residues in waterfowl and

other wildlife in Eastern Montana had caused alarm about potential health hazards from eating the affected birds.

Bill Brownlee, the department's director of migratory bird programs, said the collected birds had no detectable amounts of Endrin in their bodies. "We also have collected 100 ducks from the eastern part of the state for analysis, but the results are not yet available," Brownlee said.

The West Texas birds, which included pintails, wigeons and teal, were examined at the Texas Tech University School of Medicine Pesticide Laboratory in San Benito.

Brownlee said, however, that hunters concerned about pesticide residues in waterfowl should skin the birds instead of picking them since Endrin concentrates primarily in body fat and fatty tissues. Also, drippings and internal organs of the birds should not be utilized when cooking.

Raiders End Season Losing To East Bernard 14-0 Friday

Brahmas Rally For Two Fourth Quarter TD's

Two fourth quarter touchdowns by East Bernard broke a scoreless tie between the Rice High School Raiders and the Brahmas to give East Bernard a 14-0 win in the final week of District 22AAA football action last Friday night.

J. B. Scott rushed for both East Bernard touchdowns and rushed for 155 yards in 29 carries to boost his season rushing total over the 1700 yard mark while a near capacity crowd watched at Raider Stadium in Altair.

Rice winds up league play with a 4-3 mark and is 7-3 overall. East Bernard ends play 6-1 and 9-1 overall. The Waller Bulldogs wrapped up the District title with a 30-0 win over Brazos and for the third straight season will represent the league in the State playoffs. The champs enter the playoffs this Friday night taking on Barbers Hill in Baytown.

In other games "around the league," Columbus whipped Sealy 61-14 and Bellville topped Hempstead 47-0.

Mistakes Costly For Rice
For Rice it was five turnovers; a pair of "super-duper" costly penalties; and a failure to convert a crucial fourth down play in the first

half that thwarted any hopes of closing out the 1981 season with a win.

But on the other hand it was an overall team effort by the Brahmas that caused most of the turnovers and penalties that stopped the Raiders when they needed to make yardage to make the difference in the game.

The Raiders were held to 122 yards rushing in the game with fullback Rob Johnson claiming 50 yards on 13 carries. Rice picked

up 19 yards on two pass completions and had only six first downs in the contest. The Brahmas punched out 222 yards on the ground and completed three key passes in the contest for 45 yards and had 15 first downs. Though Scott accumulated most of the Brahmas rushing total, credit his offensive line and fullback John Kubena for opening most of the holes.

Scoring By E.B.
Scott scored East Bernard's first touchdown on a one yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter to cap an impressive 11 play, 80 yard drive. Reserve quarterback Ronnie Orsak came off the bench late in the third quarter to direct the decisive scoring drive. Then, following a Raider turnover on the Brahmas 44, Orsak led his troops to another score that wrapped up the victory. It was Scott again, this time racing 40 yards untouched by the Raider defense for the touchdown that led the victory with only 2:28 left to play. John Kubena added the extra point kicks after both scores.
