

Marijuana In Fayette County Bust Valued At \$4 Million

Four men arrested near Muldoon in Fayette County early Tuesday, Nov. 10 and jailed at La Grange were found in possession of more than 7,000 pounds of marijuana, Fayette County Sheriff Vantine Koopman reported.

That amount of marijuana has a street value of about \$4 million, he said.

The four were arrested at 12:30 a.m. on FM 154, the road between West Point and Flatonia, about four miles from Hwy. 71.

State and federal undercover men had had the two vehicles in which the men were riding under surveillance since Monday morning. They were driving a Ryder rental truck and a 1980 Oldsmobile.

The four men were brought to the Fayette County jail at about 5 a.m. Justice of the Peace Lloyd Goehring set a bond of \$250,000 for each of them.

The men were identified as Michael Jerry Miles, 29, of Aransas Pass; Joseph Lee Sewell, 30, of Austin; Bernard Eugene Christ, 40, of Galveston; and Bruce Carter, 26, of Houston.

Sheriff Koopman said officers had made busts in Jefferson County Monday morning, confiscating about

60,000 pounds of the weed in a house and a barn. Eight Cuban nationals were arrested at Hamshire.

The marijuana was said to have come from Columbia-Weimer Mercury.

4 New Oil, Gas Drilling Locations

Four new oil and gas drilling sites in this area highlight oil and gas activity this week.

Houtey Petroleum Inc. of Houston will drill the No. 1 H. M. Brownson 11 miles southwest of Nada on a 183 acre lease in the B.S. and F. Survey of this county. The well is projected to 3,500 feet.

The No. 1 Heyne "D" is planned as a 5,000 foot wildcat 2 1/2 miles west northwest of Egypt by TXO Production of Corpus Christi. The well is in a 426 acre lease in Wharton County's Joseph Newman Survey A-48.

Hamman Oil and Refining of Houston will drill the No. 1 B. D. Anderson in the North Chesterfield Field. The well, scheduled to go to 6,500 feet, is in a 160 acre lease four miles east of Eagle Lake, in the George McGinnick Survey.

Another new location is the No. 2 Englehart Gas Unit three miles SSE of Altair due to go to 9,000 feet. The well is by Corpus Christi based TXO in a 323 acre lease in the Joseph Grant Survey.

Sandlin Development Inc. of Sugar Land has completed the No. 2 L. E. Engstrom in the proposed Kainer Field. The well is flowing 102 barrels of crude and 755,000 cubic feet of gas per day on a 126 1/2 inch choke.

Drymalla Const. Asks Damages For Short Delivery

Drymalla Construction Co., Inc. of Columbus filed suit in District Court, Nov. 13th against Sharkey Transportation, Inc. of Quincy, Ill. for alleged shortage in a shipment of equipment.

In the petition, the plaintiff sets out that on Sept. 20, 1979 it contracted with Gardner-Denver Co. for two air compressors, one air receiver and two air coolers for the sum of \$61,328 to be delivered to Quanex Corp. in Belville.

Delivery was made Feb. 18, 1980 and at that time only two skids were delivered when four were on the bill of lading. The plaintiff alleges that the driver represented that the other two were inside the two delivered, when actually they were not. Hence the Drymalla firm asks for damages in the amount of \$18,101.30 or three times that amount for punitive damages, plus attorney's fees.

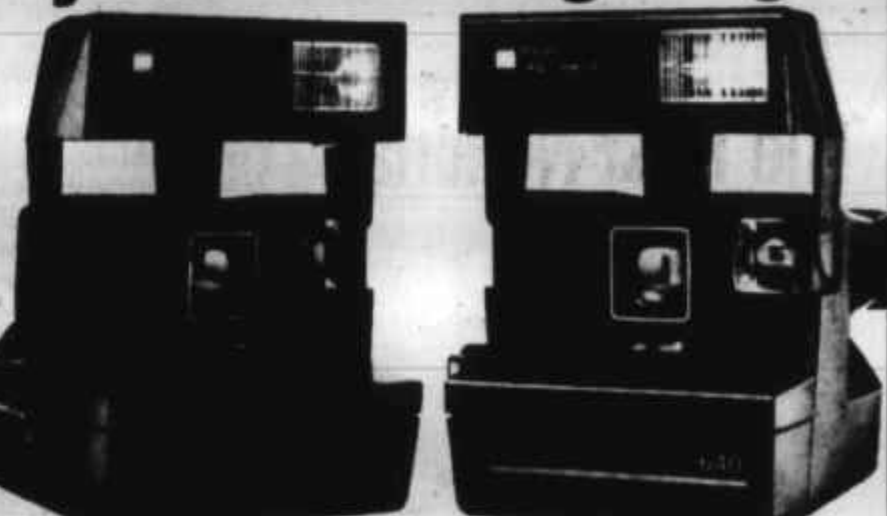

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Nov. 20 Deadline To Apply For SBA Loans At Hallettsville

The U. S. Small Business Administration Disaster Office in Hallettsville, Texas reported that this is the final week to apply for SBA Disaster loan assistance. The deadline date is Friday, November 20. Applications may be turned in at the office or may be mailed to the Disaster Field Office located at 114 N. La Grange, Hallettsville, Texas 77964. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Robert V. Moreno, Disaster Branch Manager, stated that "the disaster office in Hallettsville will remain open until we have completed all loan processing; however, we will not accept late applications after November 20, 1981."

Moreno also reported that 57 loans have been approved as of the close of business on November 12, 1981. There have been 42 homes/personal property loans approved for \$307,600.00 and 15 business loans approved for \$665,000.00 for a total of \$1,032,600.00 for Lavaca and adjacent counties.

For those victims interested in applying, home and personal property loans carry a minimum interest rate of 6% and a maximum interest rate of 15.25%. Business loans carry a minimum interest rate of 6% and a maximum interest rate of 20%. The interest rate SBA will charge will be determined on a case by case basis at the processing stage.

The loan is limited to a maximum of \$50,000.00 to restore residences; \$10,000.00 to restore personal items and contents; or \$55,000.00 for both purposes.

Loans for eligible businesses may not exceed 85% of the actual amount of damages so long as the total loan does not exceed \$500,000.00.
