The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion with flowers and candles. The back altar was centered with a large epergne of white gladioli, carnations, pom poms and greenery. To either side, were two tall tree candelabras holding tall white tapers entwined with English ivy and bakers fern. The main altar held the couple's unity candle and two white tapers used in the candlelighting ceremony of the service. To

either side of this were two fan candelabras with white tapers, English ivy, and bakers fern.
