Duck Shooting Ends At Sunset Sunday

The first segment of the 1981-82 duck season will come to an end at sunset this Sunday, Nov. 29th; however, all geese remain in season.

Ducks and geese became legal targets on November 7th and the season has been reported as a "fair one" to date. Ducks have not however been present in this area in the numbers which normally prevail. Number of geese is reported to be the largest ever and more are due with the arrival of cold weather.

Ducks will be out of season through December 11th and will become legal once again on Saturday, Dec. 12, 1981. All geese, including snows, blues, Ross, Canadian and Speckled Bellied (White-Fronted) geese, remain in season from the Nov. 7th opening date through Sunday, January 17th, 1982.

The Raiders also played in Boling last Friday, sweeping two games there, and were to play three games with Youkum at Raider Gym on Tuesday night.

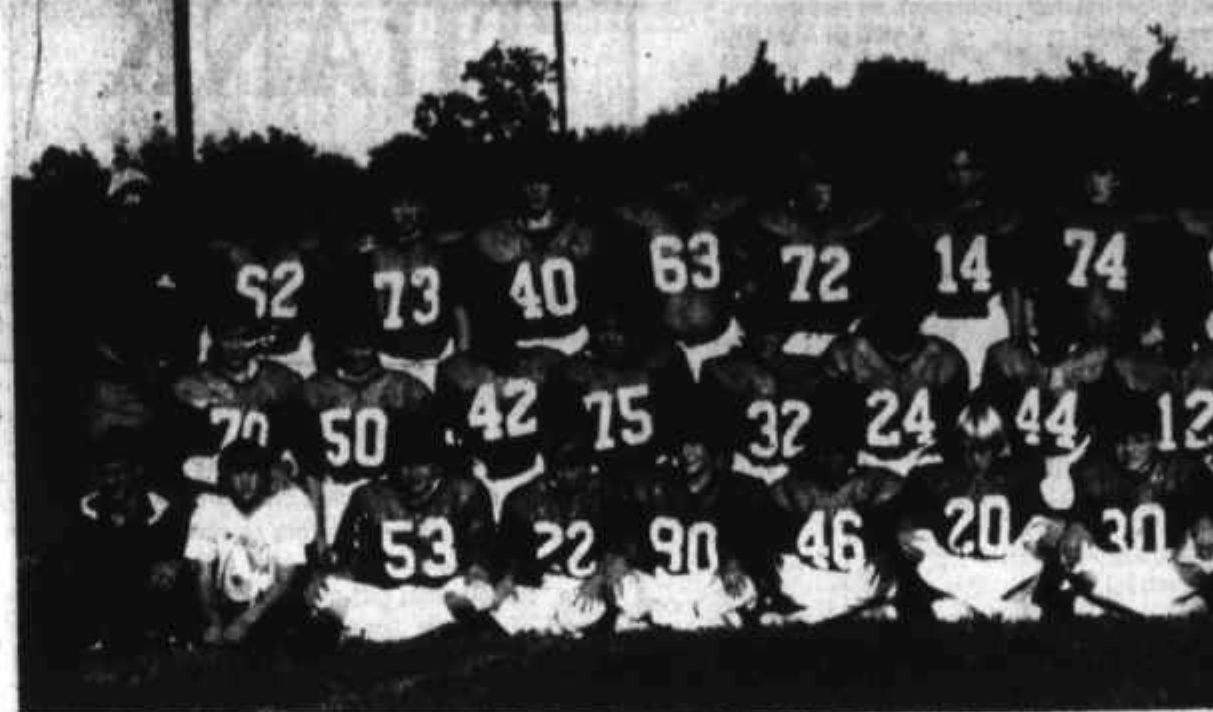

The sheriff's department received a call on the accidental shooting at 6 p.m. Investigation revealed that people from Houston were using the campsite with permission of the owner. One of the hunters reportedly left a loaded 30-06 rifle across a table. Michael Ahlschlager, 21, was walking by the table when the rifle was accidentally bumped by Darryl Dornak and the gun went off. The bullet entered Ahlschlager's leg and went down the leg, reportedly shattering the bone.
