El Campo Hosp. Settles With Dr. For \$115,000

Attorneys for the El Campo Hospital Authority and for Dr. Angela O'Connor have negotiated a \$115,000 settlement in a suit against the El Campo hospital, its board of directors and several physicians. The agreement was awaiting Dr. O'Connor's signature last week, according to a story by Chris Barber in the El Campo Leader-News.

Dr. O'Connor claimed civil rights violations when she was suspended from the El Campo Memorial Hospital Staff on Sept. 10, 1979, for an alleged violation of obstetrical privileges that were revoked on July 30, 1979.

Melvin Parker, Jr., ECHA board president, said the matter is not fully resolved, however, since O'Connor is in her home country of Ireland and has not signed the papers releasing the defendants from their liability.

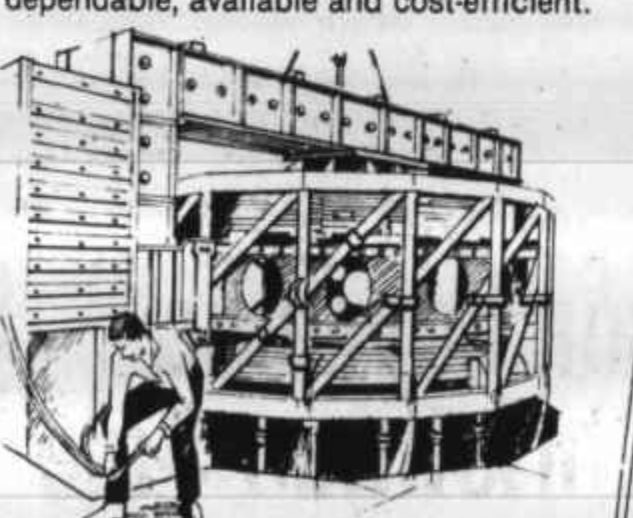

This is TEXT—the Texas Experimental Tokamak at the University of Texas Fusion Research Center in Austin. The machine will be used by scientists from throughout the nation to expand our knowledge of nuclear fusion.

As long as natural gas was plentiful and economical, it was the only fuel CPL used to make electricity. We had to turn to other sources when gas supplies were threatened for both long-term and short-term use — and when gas prices climbed higher and higher.

Among the new sources being studied are solar repowering, ocean thermal energy conversion, and geothermal resources in the Gulf Coast area. In addition, we are testing the feasibility of wind energy here in South Texas. The gasification project at CPL's La Palma plant already has demonstrated the technical feasibility of making gas out of abundant solid fuels.

Alternate forms of energy — nuclear fusion and nuclear breeder reactors — that might completely replace those now used for generation of electricity also are being explored, but probably will not be ready before the turn of the century.

Since 1957 CPL has participated in the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation, which supports nuclear fusion research at the University of Texas. Fusion offers the promise of satisfying our ever-increasing demands for energy while also protecting the environment: the fuel for nuclear fusion is abundant in ordinary sea water.

Scientists hope that a demonstration plant can be built by the year 2000, with commercial production of electricity possible a decade later.

Another possibility for power generation in the long-range future is the breeder reactor, which could — if fully developed — extend the use of nuclear fuel by several thousand years. CPL helps sponsor research in this field through the Breeder Reactor Corporation.

With steady, ongoing research into new technologies CPL can help develop the new energy sources that will enable us to hold future costs down while continuing to provide reliable electric service for all South Texas.
