No Room In The Inn

Have you ever traveled at night and had difficulty finding a place to stay? A family on vacation traveled longer than they intended before looking for a motel. It was late and the children were tired and fretting and everybody was ready for a good night's sleep. As they drove along the highway, they found no rooms available. Time and again their hopes were dashed by the No Vacancy signs.

How much more difficult it must have been for the Holy Family when they arrived in Bethlehem and learned that the inn was full. The journey by donkey had been long and tiring. How Joseph must have pleaded with the inn keeper, telling him of Mary's condition and their need for a suitable place where she could give birth to her child. But there was no room for them in the inn.

Today a similar situation is being repeated in thousands of lives. There are so many things that crowd our lives and leave no room for Jesus.

Perhaps the most common is materialism, the humanist philosophy that puts its faith in things. In fact, commercialism has become a large part of our celebration of Jesus' birth. How easily the world rubs off on us and taints us with its philosophy. We fill our lives with so much of the world that there is no room for the heavenly.

We also fill our lives with self-seeking goals. The popular idea of abundant life consists of the number of luxuries we indulge ourselves or the number of possessions we have obtained. We need to remember Jesus' words: "Take heed and beware of all covetousness; for a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." Jesus' whole life and teachings were contrary to the popular idea of the abundant life.

The story of Christmas is the story of love. The Babe of Bethlehem was the self-giving love of God made real to the world. The abundant life consists not in self-seeking goals but in self-giving love; not in what we receive but what we give.

Then I love the world that he gave his only Son. "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son." Yet the world did not receive him. The angels declared the message of "peace on earth, good will toward men" yet there is little peace or good will on earth. He came teaching the truth of God, yet the world has not taken him seriously.

But we cannot say it has made no difference. Although there was no room for him in the inn, there was room for him in the humble stable. So it has been through the centuries. Though the world has not received him there are those who have found room for him who like the manger are lowly in heart and humble in soul.

Have you any room for Jesus?

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Former Congressman Clark W. Thompson Dies Of Stroke

Former United States Congressman Clark W. Thompson, Sr., 86, of Galveston died of a stroke at his home Wednesday, Dec. 16th. He was the representative from Texas' 9th Congressional District, which included this area of the state, from 1933-34 and from 1947-1967.

Thompson first went to Washington when he was elected to fill the unexpired term of former Rep. Clay Briggs in 1933. When the term expired, he did not seek re-election to Congress until 1947. He retired from the House of Representatives in 1967.

Thompson, a native of LaCrosse, Wis., was a U.S. Marine Corps veteran. He was married to the former Libbie Moody, Jr. of Galveston.

During his last years in Congress, Thompson held seats on the House Ways and Means Committee, the Mer-

chant Marine and Fisheries Committee and the Agriculture Committee.

After his retirement from public office, Thompson worked for a Houston public relations firm and later returned to Washington as director of the Tennessee Oil Co.'s office there.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 19th at Galveston's Trinity Episcopal Church. Burial was at Galveston Memorial Park in Hitchcock, under the direction of J. Levy and Bro. Funeral Home in Galveston.

Survivors include his wife, a son, Clark W. Thompson, Jr. of Houston; a brother, Wells Thompson of Seattle; and two sisters, Victorian Siverts of Seattle and Mally McNaughton of Portland, Ore.
