Q: You mean it cools as well as heats? Just what is a heat pump, anyway?
A: A heat pump is a year-round home heating-and-cooling system that runs entirely on electricity - the most flexible and available form of energy we have. Moreover, it is more energy efficient than any other combination heating/cooling unit currently available. It is called a heat pump because it "pumps", or moves, heat from where it is not needed to where it is needed.

Q: How does a heat pump work?
A: In winter, it absorbs heat that exists naturally outside - even in very cold weather - and moves it inside to warm the house. In hot weather, it works like an air conditioner, moving the heat from indoors to outdoors to keep the house comfortably cool. The heat pump also dehumidifies as it cools.

Q: What accounts for the heat pump's superior efficiency?
A: There's a simple explanation: It's easier and less expensive to move heat than to make it. The heat taken out of the air by the heat pump is free - put there by the sun. Gas and other conventional systems must generate new heat - and consume costly fuels in the process.

Q: Is the heat pump a good choice for homes in our part of the country?
A: Absolutely! Although it works well in colder places, the heat pump performs best in regions with a relatively mild climate like ours.

Q: What are the heat pump's chief advantages?
A: The chief one is that its great efficiency results in more economical operation - and you save money on electricity bills. Electric resistance heat, for example, gives one unit of heat for each unit of energy, so you get a dollar's worth of heat for each dollar's worth of power. But a properly installed heat pump in a South Texas home can produce at least 2 1/2 units of heat for each unit of energy required to run it. That means you get \$2.50 worth of heat for every dollar you spend to operate your heat pump. In addition, a heat pump is clean and safe (no fuels burn inside your house), and it is a wise investment because it enhances the value of your home.

Q: Where can I get more information about the heat pump?
