Board members Bill Appelt and Lavo Brisco expressed comments that costs were not so great that they could not be recovered in a short period of time, by releasing coaches and maintenance personnel to other work areas. They joined Page Clippard, John Engstrom and Board President Ted Wise in voting for the installation.

Suplt. King told the board members that the district has collected \$38,483 in delinquent taxes to date under a program instituted last summer. LCRA proposes to lease the lake and it will remain a private lake as in the past under control of the Wintermann Estate.

The lake was ruled a "private body of water" by the courts in 1908 while John Kirby, owner of Lakeside Irrigation, contested the ruling all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court during 1908.
