Payments received at that time are treated as taxable income but, since most individuals are in a lower tax bracket after retirement, the tax savings can be significant.

You may make your entire I.R.A. contribution for the year at that time or, if you wish, we'll be happy to arrange for deposits to be made in regular installments during the year.

Co. Tax Office In Basement Of Courthouse

Colorado County citizens are reminded that the office of Henry J. Hajovsky, the county tax officer, is now located in the basement of the County Courthouse in Columbus.

The tax officer was formerly located on the main floor of the courthouse; however, those offices were turned over to the Central Appraisal District earlier this year.

"Many people are not aware or have forgotten about the well-publicized move of my office to the basement of the courthouse," says Hajovsky. "Every day people are knocking on the wrong door and it is creating an inconvenience for office personnel whose work is being interrupted."

The tax officer urges citizens to note the new location of his office in the basement of the courthouse to avoid any confusion or inconveniences upon your visit to the courthouse.

Hajovsky also reminds county residents that his office no longer assesses or collects county ad valorem taxes but still handles licenses and titles for vehicles and boats, voter registration, and beer and liquor licenses.

City Council, Engineer Discuss Error In Locating Utility Lines Extension

Error Increased Cost Of Austin Utility Extension By \$3,593.22

Members of the Eagle Lake City Council and Mayor Elmer Struss, obviously upset over an error made by the engineering firm of O'Malley & Clay of Brenham in locating proposed utility lines to the Austin Estates Subdivision on the southern edge of the city, had a lengthy discussion of the error and additional costs resulting from the error at the meeting of the council on Tuesday night of last week.

The discussion was held under control by Mayor Struss, but several councilmen, especially Gene Baker and Roy Dean Van Nort, were adamant in maintaining the error and resulting additional cost of \$3,593.22 were the responsibility of the engineering firm.

The council approved last week a final payment of \$5,136.03 to Civil Constructors for extending water and sewer lines to the Austin Estates Subdivision on the southern edge of the city. Total cost of the project amounted to \$20,150.31.

An engineer from O'Malley & Clay, Bob McDaniels, was

present at the session and presented to the council a statement for \$547.91 as the balance due for engineering services which totaled \$1,713.63.

No Utility Easement

Also present at the session was G. H. Tate who owns land in the area and on whose property the engineering firm had originally planned the water and sewer line extension program. Since the city does not own a utility right of way easement on his property, Mr. Tate told the council that he wanted repairs made to a damaged fence and repairs made to a hole which had been dug for a proposed man-hole site for the sewer system. A number of the councilmen and Mayor Struss reminded McDaniels that they had urged him not to enter upon the Tate property without Mr. Tate's permission at the time the project was first being designed.

The engineering firm designed the extension to be made along a fence line but on the Tate property. When Tate pointed out that the city owned no right of way easement on his property, the contractor removed equipment from the property and the extensions were moved to a right of way easement (20') behind houses on Guadalupe Streets in the Guadalupe Addition.

Admits Error

McDaniels contended that in his opinion the city had not been "damaged." He said that the contractor bill the city for the job to lay the lines on the Tate property where much more adaptable soils with better drainage exist, and probably would have had a higher cost if it had originally been the project of the easement in the Guadalupe Addition since soils in that area are less adaptable and poorly drained. He did admit that he had erred in designing the extension project on Mr.

Tate property but he had been under the impression that there was a utility easement on the property, but admitted that he had not "checked the records to verify that easement."

Tate told the council that he had been contacted by McDaniels said that "the buck stops here. I assume responsibility for the error."

Tate Not Contacted

Councilman Van Nort commented that the real issue was that the engineer was informed not to cross the fence onto Mr. Tate's property. He held that Mr. Tate's fence should be fixed and the hole dug on his property leveled to his satisfaction.

Councilman Kohlfelt voiced a similar opinion when he made the motion to pay the contractor what was due to him only after the damages to Tate property were corrected. Councilman Mike Duarte seconded that motion.

Councilman Gene Baker

questioned the additional costs required to complete the project and suggested that the contractor should bill the engineering firm for the additional cost of \$3,593.22 required to move the project from one location to another.

Generally the council agreed with the mayor and City Manager Robert Klockman that the contractor was not at fault and did a satisfactory job in completing the project. Baker said that he conscientiously felt the additional costs to the city were wrong, but agreed to

City's Sewer Plant Project Running Behind Schedule

Council OK's Agreement With Highway Dept.

In action Tuesday night of last week, Eagle Lake city council passed an agreement with the Texas Highway Department calling for the highway department to have authority for maintenance, control, regulation and supervision of highways passing through the city of Eagle Lake. A similar agreement has been approved by the council since December of 1973 on an annual basis.

City Manager Bob Klockman reported that a plat for the Trendmark Subdivision to be constructed on Hubbard's Ferry Road southeast of Kevin Court Apartments, was not ready for approval. This item was passed to a later meeting.

The city manager reported on projects underway or to be carried out in the city, some of which included improvement to the curve on Cat Spring Road at the Brock Ashby property (the Ashbys have agreed to donate property needed to improve the hazardous curve); paving of streets and improving street signs; preparation of the budget and others.

Plant Behind Schedule

Klockman also reported that the contractor for the sewer plant rehabilitation and construction program has had difficulty in keeping deep vote with others present to make the payment to Civil Constructors unanimous. Councilman Ralph Truly was not present for the meeting.

The council took no action on payment of the \$547.91 to the engineering firm and it is anticipated that further discussions will be held on the subject before the matter is finally settled.

Also the mayor noted that some residents on West Main have been added to the sewer system and suggested that annexation of the West Main area may be a project for consideration in the near future in order to extend utilities to the area from Austin Road west.

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
