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Deadline For School, City Filings Next Wed.

With the deadline for filing for places on the April 3rd ballots in the City of Eagle Lake and Rice Consolidated School District elections just a week off, all three incumbents have filed for three city offices to be filled and three for the three school board positions which expire on April 3rd.

The deadline for filing for the city and school elections is at midnight Wed., Mar. 3rd.

City candidates may file with city secretary Lucille Perry Lange at the city offices in the Municipal Building; and candidates for the school positions may file in the Administration Building at Rice High School.

Two incumbents seek re-election and one new candidate seeks a three year term on the Rice CISD board of education. Reggie Brisco, Sheridan businessman, has filed for the Sheridan Position 3 now held by Lavo Brisco. He has indicated he will not seek re-election. Incumbent trustees Bill Appelt in Eagle Lake Position 1 and Billy Hefner in Garwood Position 2, have filed or are expected to file for re-election to new three-year terms. At noon Tuesday no other candidates had filed for places on the school ballot.

Mayor Seeks Re-election
Mayor Elmer Struss has filed for re-election to a new two-year term as head of the City of Eagle Lake government. Two councilmen are also to be elected on April 3rd and Roy Dean Van Nor and Eugene Baker, both incumbents, have filed for re-election.

Neighboring Contests
In the City of Columbus, terms of three councilmen, Clinton Voelkel, Martin Williams and Leon Dittmar, expire on April 3rd and they have indicated that they will seek

new two-year terms.

In the Columbus School District, the terms of Ernest Baumgart and Marvin Hiller expire in April and they have indicated that they do not plan to seek re-election. Thomas J. Zatopek has filed for one of the Columbus school board positions.

Weimar Mayor Not Running
In the City of Weimar, Mayor Davis Gindler has announced he will not seek re-election and Tommy Brasher, a councilman, has filed for that office. Terms of Brasher and Wilbur Grohmann Jr. expire; Grohmann has filed for re-election and George Kloesel has filed for the spot now filled by Brasher.

In the Weimar school district, terms of Jack Sanders, Place 3; and Catherine Gunn, Place 4, expire and both are seeking re-election to new three year terms on the Weimar board of trustees.

Absentee voting in the city and school elections will begin on Mar. 15th and end on Mar. 30th.

The Colorado County Texas Exes will hold their annual meeting at The Farris 1912 in Eagle Lake on Monday at 7:30 p.m. Highlighting the evening will be special guest speaker David McWilliams, newly appointed defensive coordinator for the University of Texas Longhorn football team; and the announcement of the 1982 scholarship winner.

Several activities have been scheduled for the annual event, announced organization president Vance Duncan of Eagle Lake.

A tri-captain of Texas' 1963 national championship team, he is a holdover from the Darrell Royal days at U.T., first joining the staff in 1970 as a freshman coach and moving up a year later to the varsity.

McWilliams, a center-line backer from Cleburne, began his coaching career at Abilene High School where he served as assistant for two years. He became head coach there in 1966 and compiled a 21-17-2 won-lost record during four years there before moving on the U.T. program.

Newsletter, the publication of the National Association of Emergency Medical Technicians, February 1982 issue, which provides food for thought about the possibilities of a lingering death following an accident. The article is adapted from "The Winds", the official publication of Wyoming Ambulance Emergency Medical Services Association.

It was an obituary that really set me thinking. "Truck driver, age 46, dies

after 15 years in hospital following an accident in which he was totally disabled."

Fifteen years of staring at the same ceiling. 180 months of complete dependence upon others. 780 weeks of hope-erosion with expense towering to crowd everything else off the skyline. 5,475 days of waiting for the night; 5,475 nights waiting for the day. 131,400 hours of the four walls, fading flowers, medical smells, useless sympathy. 7,844,000 minutes of vegetation with roots withering in hopelessness, spirit shrinking in stagnation.

473,040,000 seconds of death before burial! And probably because of some "little" fault that you might be committing every day of your driving life. Such as failure to glance left and right, or forgetting to check your rear-view mirror. Crowding the vehicle ahead. Leaning on 'luck in a blind spot. Trying to average 80 in a 50 mph zone, or in 50 mph conditions. Or just blind assumption that the other driver will do the right thing.

Dead at 46 after 15 years of dying! Within that period of time a married man usually has a family, climbs upward in the world, travels, plays, matures, enjoys a million sights, sounds, sensations. Over these same 15 years, this man was a castaway on a lonely bed-island. He absorbed tasteless food, slept a desperate sleep, suffered, cursed, cried, felt the bitterness kink his insides into knots at such ordinary sounds as laughter, free footsteps, and hearty talk.

For every person who dies in traffic smashups, many others spend agonizing weeks, months, life-times of disability. Is this how you want to live?

charitable non-profit organization to distribute the cheese.

Pilot International is a world-wide organization, with clubs in the Bahamas, Bermuda, Canada, England, France, Japan, Mexico, and the United States.

In Macon, Georgia, 1921, the name "Pilot" (for the riverboat Pilot was chosen by the founders because the word means "Leader and Guide.") They are one of the five international classified civic and service organizations for executive and professional women, similar to men's service clubs, Rotary, Kiwanis, and Lions.

Each Pilot club selects and directs its own civic and service projects. In addition to volunteering assistance to community agencies and national and international drives, they seek out neglected community ills and try to cure them.

Eligibility Requirements
In order to receive a five pound box of cheese for household consumption, recipients must complete a form to show appropriate eligibility. This application requires the name and

social security number of all adult family members. Adults without social security numbers must indicate that they do not have one. Applicants must verify the source and amount of income as well as household composition.

Families whose income is at or below the level shown on the scale may be eligible for the U.S.D.A. Donated Surplus Cheese. The scale ranges from annual income for a family of one \$7,970; \$10,530 for two; \$13,080 for three; \$15,630 for four; \$18,190 for five; \$20,740 for six; \$23,290 for seven; \$25,840 for eight; and \$2,550 annually for each additional family member.

The Contractor (Pilot Club) agrees to accept and distribute USDA-donated cheese for household consumption only by needy persons with no charges of any kind, including charges for handling and distribution, to anyone.
