House. However the board stated that the contribution was contingent on the fact that the program be a part of a long-range plan. 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Co. Courthouse Repairs To Cost \$39,444 Plus

Bids OK'd Also For \$55,025 Worth Of New Equipment For Prec. 3

Colorado County Commissioner's Court, in session Monday, approved a contract with a Houston firm for repairs to the county courthouse roof at a cost of \$39,444 plus costs of nailing boards and roof decking which need to be replaced once the roofing materials are pulled off the present roof. Also the court approved purchase of a motor grader and a tractor and slope mower for Commissioner Jerome Wicke's Precinct No. 3 at a total cost of \$55,025.

Four firms offered bids for the courthouse roof repair project. Specifications for the project were prepared by professional engineer Donald B. Naiser of the Drymala Construction Company, Columbus.

Commissioner Wicke said that he had hoped that he could have the bidders give a demonstration with their machines before accepting one of the bids; but Precinct 3 Commissioner Bill Stiles and County Judge Lester Crane pointed out that the court might be setting a bad precedent if it adopted such practice. Judge Crane said that the commissioners should familiarize themselves with the equipment to be offered before the bids were opened.

Other bidders included: River City Machinery Co. of Austin, a Ford 6610 tractor and Terrain King mower with 28'10" reach and 60" mower for \$43,182; Hyco Equipment Co. of Houston offered a John Deere 2540 tractor and a Terrain King with 29'2" reach and 60" rotary mower for \$31,990.

The court considered several alternatives by Eagle Lake Implement Co. and an alternate by Virna before accepting the \$27,800 bid made by Eagle Lake Implement Co. Edward Sunderman, representing the company, said delivery would be in 60 to 90 days.

County To Sell Surplus Equipment At Auction Apr. 3

Sets Hearing On Septic Tank Ordinance 10 A.M. Apr. 12th

Colorado County Commissioners' Court has set a public auction on a number of items of surplus equipment at 1:30 p.m. April 3rd. Included in the items to be sold at auction will be two used sheriff's cars, four used dump trucks, a small tractor, an antique tractor, dump beds and other items from Commissioner Jerome Wicke's precinct 3 and possibly other items. A complete list of the items to be sold will be published in an advertisement in a later issue.

The auction sale will be conducted at the precinct facilities on FM 109 a half mile east of Frelsburg. The court also authorized advertisement for bids for the purchase of a new pickup truck for Commissioner Bill Stiles' precinct 4. He will trade in a used 1971 pickup. The bids will be opened at the regular session on April 12th.

In other action the court established 20-ton load limits on streets in the Hajoysky Subdivision near Glidden, namely Olive Branch, Thelma, Henry, Norway, Taylor and Clayborne streets. A

So far the court has approved \$1500 from the budget allocation to the Golden Age Center and now the \$200 for the Older Texans Fair.

Albert Wehner, Columbus, chairman of the Older Texans Committee in this county, appeared before the court to make the request for the funds.

County Judge Crane was authorized to contact an electronics engineer to determine repairs that need to be made to the fire alarm system in the county jail. The recommendations will be reported to the court at the next session.

Approval was given to rehiring two former county employees: Jim Parcell who was formerly chief deputy sheriff under Sheriff Jim James H. Wooten, Jr. and Daniel Schmitt, former employee in Commissioner Jerome Wicke's precinct 3.

Old Tax Records To Be Saved The court authorized Billy Youens, the chief appraiser for the central appraisal district, to turn over old tax records for preservation in the County Archival Room in the county Courthouse. The records are not needed now since the court has wiped off all delinquencies beyond the 20-year limit as authorized under new state legislation.

The court re-appointed election officials in the voting precincts of this county; and approved the elevation of Harold Thomas from alternate judge to presiding judge and Frank Davidson to alternate judge in Eagle Lake precinct 17. Judge Crane noted that there will probably be other resignations before the next general election in November but these will be acted on as they are submitted.

The court approved a change in the minutes of the meeting on Dec. 14 to indicate the intention of the court: that the use of amine 2,4-D be permitted by ground rigs only from the period of Mar. 15 through July 31st in the area lying south of the Highway 90A and east of the Colorado River to the Wharton County Line. The minutes of that meeting omitted the location of the designated herbicide control area.

The court approved one night's lodging and travel expenses for the county's assistant veterans' service officer, Tye Holman, to attend a Spring Service Officers Conference in Victoria, Mar. 18-19.

Approved an addendum to the contract between the county and the central appraisal district, adding the wording that the "central appraisal district will not be held responsible for prior errors and omissions" prior to Jan. 1, 1975.
