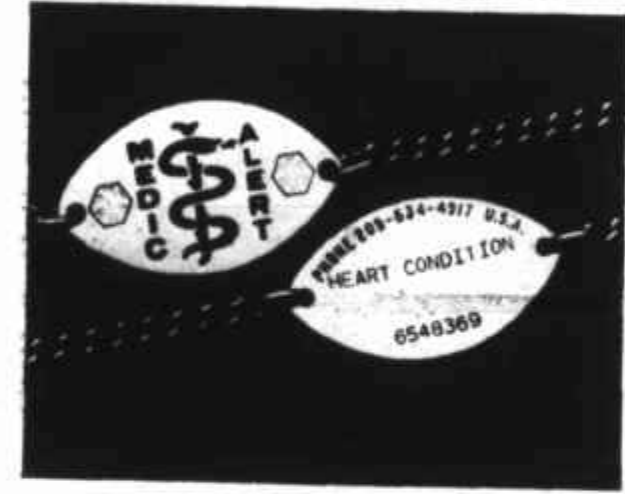

**White Shows
Confidence In
Gov.'s Race**

Democratic gubernatorial candidate Mark White included a stop in Columbus Monday on a whirlwind tour of this part of the state in behalf of his candidacy for governor in the May 1st Democratic Primary Election.

White was guest of honor at a luncheon in the Scholastic Restaurant in Columbus at 4:30 p.m. Monday. Arrangements for the visit were made by County Judge Lester J. Orzech who is serving as county chairman for the White for Governor Campaign.

Former Attorney General White expressed confidence in winning the Democratic nomination in May and in election to the governor's office in November.

**Burglars Ram Door
To Rob Stanley's**

Tip From Leopold's

To Arrest Of Three

Three persons, two of them 16-year-old juveniles, have been implicated in the burglary of Stanley's Store on Highway 90 in Columbus early Saturday morning and it is possible that other cases where we campaign indicate we will win the nomination in May.

Martinez arrested the 16-year-old minor in Columbus Sunday and the officers got a court order to retain the juvenile in jail for further investigation.

Monday at 10:30 a.m. the youth who was the first to be arrested, changed his story and admitted that he was 16 and not 17, hence he was treated as a juvenile.

The two juveniles went before county juvenile court Monday and they were released to custody of their parents.

Chief Wine said Glenn has admitted to officers that he was involved and that he gave the rest of the money to another person and this person said he gave it to someone else, so the investigation continues.

He has been placed in county jail in lieu of \$25,000 bond on the charge of burglary and is still in jail awaiting action by the grand jury to be in session Monday.

**Traffic Deaths In
Texas Increasing**

**11 Already In 1982
In Colorado County**

Traffic deaths in Texas have increased for the last two years, and there is no sign the trend is changing in 1982.

According to preliminary figures from the Texas Department of Public Safety, at least 4,691 people died on Texas roads in 1981, an increase of 267 traffic deaths as compared to 1980. Final figures for 1981 will be available after May 1, 1982.

In Colorado County, there were 459 accidents, in which 17 people were killed and 254 people were injured. According to DPS statistics, 56 of these injuries were incapacitating. In the first three months of 1982, eleven traffic fatalities have already occurred in this county.

"An incapacitating injury is when an individual is not able to walk or drive," said Charles Kruse, supervisor of data analysis for the Department of Public Safety. The remaining number of injuries are classified as non-incapacitating, such as bumps or bruises, and possible injuries such as back pains or whiplash. "Possible injuries are where a trooper sees no visible signs of injury," said Kruse.

Speed, DWI contribute

The two leading violations that contribute to traffic deaths are speeding and driving while intoxicated," said David Wells, a spokesman for the DPS. However, Wells added most drivers obey the 55 mph speed limit. "Compliance with 55 has been pretty good," said Wells.

Another factor in the rise in fatalities is an increase in driving by Texas drivers. "We're driving more vehicle miles each year," said Wells. Also, with the increase in Texas population, there are more people using Texas roads every day.

Still another factor in the increase in Texas traffic deaths and a factor in traffic deaths nationwide is the increasing popularity of small cars. People driving small cars that are involved in accidents are eight times more likely to die than someone driving a full-sized car, according to statistics compiled by the National Safety Council.

**Tie To Cause A Run-off
For Columbus ISD Bd.**

**McAlister Wins Spot;
Stallman, King Tie**

Voters in the Columbus and East Bernard School Districts went to the polls in heavy numbers in elections held Saturday and in East Bernard, two new candidates unseated incumbents while one new Columbus School Board member was elected and a tie resulted for the second position to be filled.

In the Columbus Independent School District, Trish McAlister was elected with 311 votes, but a run-off will be required to fill the second position on the board. Bob Stallman and Leah Wilson King each received 208 votes and the Columbus School Board is expected to meet in special session soon to set the date for a run-off election.

Other candidates in the race for the two offices which were vacated when board president Ernest Baumgart and Marvin Hilmer chose not to seek re-election were Thomas Zatepek and Mac Ruffalo with 158 votes each. John Barten received 67 votes.

East Bernard Voting

In the balloting in the East Bernard School District, incumbent trustees Hank Koyne and Wilfred V. Strubor were unseated in a heavy voting in East Bernard and Lisse.

For Position 3, Strubor received 237 votes, but Charles Chauvin was elected with 458 votes. A third candidate, Jean Spener, received 122 votes.

For Position 4 on the board, incumbent Koyne received 292 votes and was defeated by Beth Boettcher with 533 votes.

Columbus City Council

There was no opposition in the races for three council positions on the Columbus city council and Clinton Voelkel, Martin Williams and Leon Dittmar were re-elected unopposed.

New Weimar Mayor

Tommy Brasher, a former city councilman, was elected mayor of the City of Weimar without opposition. The incumbent mayor Davis Gindler did not seek re-election.

Two new council members were named at Weimar without opposition, Wilbur Grohmann, Jr. and George Kloesel (he will fill Brasher's former office); and in the Weimar school balloting, two incumbents, Catherine Gunn and Jack Sanders, were also re-elected without opposition.
