## Walleys Stolen From Motel Room Thurs. Night

Two men from South Dakota who occupied a room at the Nu Courts motel at 723 East Main Street in Eagle Lake lost their walleys to a burglar who entered their room while they were asleep some time during Thursday night.

Robert C. Johansson of North Dakota told the investigating officer, Patrolman Andy Munoz, that he and his brother retired between 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. Thursday night and woke up at 4:30 a.m. Friday only to find their walleys had been taken from their respective "pockets." Each man reported papers and \$6.00 in currency missing from their walleys.

## Minute Stop

Was made in partially obstructed from vision by two large public telephones and the burglars also moved a large brown trash can in front of the opening to obstruct viewing of the hole from the highway which passes in front of the store.

Chief Winebrenner commented that the burglars apparently went right straight to the area where the money was hidden and did not bother other items in the store, and then exited by the back door.

Assisting in the investigation were Sheriff Jim Broussard, Deputy Sheriff Curly Wied, and Weimar Chief of Police Ken Hollan.

Officers continue to question some suspects, however admit that they have few clues with which to work at this time.

Only ten days, May 24th, hold burglars broke into the Methodist parsonage occupied by the minister, the Rev. and Mrs. Charles Runk while the Runks were attending services at the church and took nearly \$4,000 in silver and jewelry.

Chief Winebrenner was quick to note however that he could see no connection between the two burglaries.

## Grand Jury To Consider Capital Murder Case Mon.

The February Grand Jury in Colorado County will be reconvened in special session at 10 a.m. next Monday, April 12th with District Judge B. R. Schraub presiding.

The jurors are due to consider a number of criminal cases to be brought to their attention by the district attorney's office, including the charge of capital murder in the death of an elderly Black man February 21st. The man, identified as Samuel McCoy, 79, of Richmond, was found on County Road 207 northeast of Weimar. An autopsy revealed the man died of a blow to the throat.

Harvey Ellis Hemphill, 24, of Richmond, has been charged with capital murder in the case and is in the county jail in lieu of a \$20,000 bond on the charge. Hemphill and a companion, Rosie Linda DeLeon, 18, of Rosenberg, were arrested in Lafayette Louisiana and were extradited to this county. Since she was eight and one-half months pregnant, she was released on a \$2000 bond on a charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. She has since given birth to twin sons.

Hemphill gave the investigating officers a written statement on the incident which started out as a robbery by DeLeon and Hemphill. While DeLeon lured McCoy into a motel room, Hemphill reportedly tried to rob McCoy and blow he received to the throat caused the death.

Hemphill and DeLeon loaded the body into the trunk of his own car and disposed of the body in this county and then ended up in Lafayette, Louisiana.

The grand jury is expected to consider capital murder 79, of Richmond, was found on County Road 207 northeast of Weimar. An autopsy revealed the man died of a blow to the throat.

Most of the other criminal cases involve burglaries or thefts, according to the sheriff's office.

## City Council OK's Budget For 1982-83

The Eagle Lake city council met in regular session Tuesday night of this week, and after a couple of minor changes, gave its approval to an \$858,489 budget for the fiscal year 1982-83 which began on April 1st.

During the meeting, results of the April 3rd city election were canvassed, approved and winners were declared. Mayor Elmer Struss and Councilmen Gene Baker and Roy D. Van Nert, all unopposed in the election, were re-elected to their positions in the city government for two-year terms and were sworn into office by mayor pro-tem Alvin Koblitz.

A public hearing was held prior to the approval of the

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## Property Owners, Highway Dept. Discuss Hwy. 90A Widening

A gathering of almost sixty persons, property owners on Highway 90A, Laughlin Road and in the Ridgeville Addition, members of the City Council, and other interested citizens, met with officials of the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation here last Wednesday to discuss proposed widening of Highway 90A (McCarty St.) on the western edge of the city.

Mayor Elmer Struss welcomed all to the meeting and set the ground rules for the discussion of the proposed project. He pointed out that the city administration has been "trying for years" to get the highway department to do something about improving safety and drainage in the area. Funds are now available and the highway department will discuss proposed work to be included in the project, said the mayor.

Highway Department District 18 (headquartered in Yoakum) Engineer - Carl Ramert was chief spokesman for the department. He introduced other department personnel present including Earl Wyatt, District Administrator; Billy Schwars, District Design Engineer; and Bruce Rayless (of Columbus), Resident Engineer for Austin and Colorado Counties.

Traffic To Double

District Engineer Ramert stated the gathering when he announced that the present number of vehicles using Highway 90A today (\$100 to \$500 vehicles per day) will more than double (up to 17,000 vehicles per day) by the year 2000. "This," said Ramert, "is a conservative projection and it could exceed those figures even more." He estimated in a later comment that 25.3% of the vehicles using the highway today are trucks.

He stated that the projections were influenced by a report made by a Study Committee, named by Governor Bill Clements, which projects that the population of Texas will have a seven million (or approximately 50%) increase by the year 2000.

In discussing the proposed improvements on Highway 90A entering the city from the west, the engineer commented that a curb and gutter section "would be most ideal" but noted the property owners' objection to this and added the state doesn't have funds to do it alone. He did add however that the Highway Commission has allocated a half million dollars in funds for total funding of the project (at no cost to city taxpayers).

The burglars kicked out a panel at the front of the store and then went to a refrigerated cooler at the rear of the store where they rummaged the contents before locating and walking off with a bag of money containing currency which was left for the next morning's opening of the store.
