Sound Management Can Save In Rice Irrigation Costs

[By Robert F. Adams, Agricultural Engineer, Soil Conservation Service] Although rice production demands a great amount of water, rice farmers do not have to tap a great amount of money from their budgets for water expenses if they plan a sound water management program.

Regardless of the type of application system they use, rice producers may conserve money as well as water by considering advice from Soil Conservation Service area engineer, Robert F. Adams.

"The most important tip I can offer to farmers concerns timing the application of water to meet the plant needs while making use of available rainfall," said Adams. "To reduce the number of days that the field is flooded, farmers should apply the flood when three out of 10 plants are in the cotton" or when panicle development begins and they should dry the field before harvest. Also, less water can be used by reducing the number of flushings or eliminating flushings when rainfall is adequate."

Adams also stresses the need to use herbicides to kill weeds in the rice field rather than using water as a weed control agent. Farmers need to stop putting more water on the field than is necessary. Herbicides may be expensive, but in the long run they will be cheaper than water," said Adams.

Six-Year Cancer Study To Span Entire Nation

wants to know: Have these changes had any effects - good or bad - on the number of various cancers and even some other diseases? Data from another study in 1959, the first one like this new one, of almost as many people, suggested several things.

There are dangers in cigarette smoking, added risk of uterine or ovarian cancer from moderate exercise, benefits from moderate exercise in preventing cardiovascular disease. Researchers conducting the new study will ask some of the same questions the first one did - but now their purpose is to "extend the 1959 observations." In addition, since things have changed in the past 21 years, many questions will deal with new areas: What is the effect of caffeine in coffee or cola drinks? Are the newer low-tar, low-nicotine cigarettes really less hazardous, and if so, by how much? What is air pollution doing to humans? Is hard water different from soft water in terms of cancer-causing agents? What long-term effects may result from low levels of radiation? What industrial chemicals truly are dangerous? What elements in food may be hazardous?

To launch the study, the American Cancer Society volunteers will visit homes all over the nation to enlist the help of people who agree to be questioned periodically for at least six years. Study leaders estimate its cost at about \$10 million. But, they say, only large-scale, long term studies can provide answers to these questions.
