E.L. Kindergarten Registration Set Monday, May 3rd

All parents who have a child five years old on or before September 1, 1982 should register at the Eagle Lake Primary School gym on Monday, May 3rd between 2:45 and 3:30 p.m.

Parents are encouraged to bring a shot record and a birth certificate to the registration. If possible, as they will be required before a child will be placed in a classroom in August. The required immunizations are: D.P.T., Polio, Rubella, Rubella, and Mumps for everyone except the 3rd Graders. Exclusions from compliance are: Medical contraindications, religious conflicts; and in the case of Rubella, Rubella, and Mumps a doctor's certification of history of the disease.

Copies of the birth certificates will be made and the originals will be returned to the parents after school begins in August, said principal Major Bengt.

A sixteen-year-old Black youth from Eagle Lake was found to be the one involved in the recent entry of the Eagle Lake Middle School following a jury trial in County Juvenile Court last Wednesday and Thursday.

County Juvenile Judge Lester J. Crane presided at the trial. Serving on the jury were: Coila Brooks, Clara Lohr, Howard Rabae, Jewelene Fling, Sophie P. Martin and Eleanor J. Fogle. Selection of the jury started on Wednesday morning of last week and the case went to trial that afternoon and continued Thursday morning. The case went to the jury shortly before noon and the jurors deliberated only forty-five minutes in returning the verdict. Sentencing has been set for May 14th. The youth could possibly be sent to the Texas Youth Council for a rehab-

Annual Rabies Clinic Here Thurs., Apr. 29

The City of Eagle Lake will sponsor the annual Rabies Vaccination Clinic at the Eagle Lake fire station from 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, April 29th and all pet owners are urged to make plans to have their cats and dogs registered and inoculated against the dreaded disease rabies.

Dr. Karen Euers, local veterinarian, will vaccinate the pets and city personnel will assist in registering the pets for a fee of \$6.00 per animal. The spring of the year is the time when the incidence of rabies increases and city officials point out that in the past several years, as well as skunks, have been found to be rabid. These cases were in and bordering the city and another outbreak of rabies can be headed off if everyone will have their pets (dogs and cats) vaccinated on April 29th, said city manager Bob Kloekman.

Health officials point out that man and all warm-blooded animals are susceptible to rabies. Once the rabies is contracted, there is no satisfactory treatment. Watch Out For... Citizens are urged to watch out for: bold, friendly or apparently tame wild animals, and for night animals, such as the skunk or fox, in daytime; For pets that have difficulty walking, eating or drinking. Signs of excitement or viciousness should be noted in normally quiet animals; For animals that tear at or scratch an old wound until it bleeds; And for cattle that "strain" long periods.

"Once your pet contracts rabies, it's too late. There is no cure. Only a preventative. Don't take chances with your pet's life or yours," warn health officials.

The annual El Campo Regional Science and Engineering Fair will be held April 21-23. The event is co-sponsored by the El Campo Lions and El Campo Independent School District.
