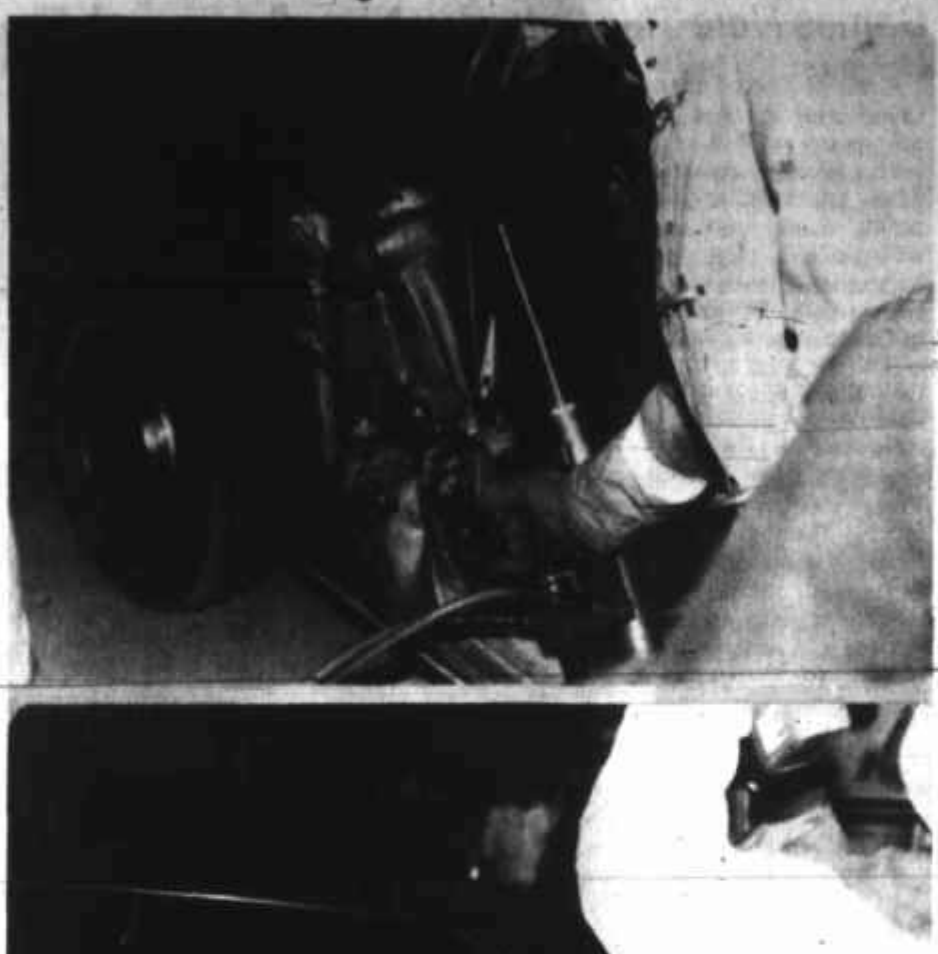


Life-Saving Jaws Of Life In Action

tions in Huntsville. It is estimated that the cost of these two projects alone will run nearly \$30,000; hence the department officials and members feel that the "Jaws of Life" can be purchased only if contributions come from safety-minded individuals and businesses in the community.

If you would like to contribute any amount, no matter how large or small, toward the purchase of the emergency rescue equipment, which can perhaps save the life of a loved one, you may do so by sending the contribution to the First National Bank or give the contribution to any fireman. In the demonstration here recently, a wrecked vehicle

was literally cut and pulled apart in a matter of minutes which in effect would have freed any person or persons who might have been trapped in the badly smashed vehicle.

The rescue system operates from a power unit which can be operated from an electrical circuit or gasoline-powered or even by a hand pump.

One of the 3 main hydraulic tools is the Hydraulic Cutter which weighs about thirty-six pounds and is a powerful portable cutter capable of cutting auto door posts, chain-link and security fences, and heavy sheet metal barriers in seconds which might be critical to the life of a person severely injured and trapped in the vehicle.

Also the system includes a Rescue Ram, an extension

Beta Sigma Phi Celebrate 51st Anniversary

Government officials across the world are signing proclamations recognizing April 30, 1982 as the start of "Beta Sigma Phi Year" in their cities, states and provinces.

The upcoming Founder's Day celebration will be held Saturday, April 24 at The Farris 1912. The anniversary will be observed by the Xi Pi Psi and Alpha Delta Phi chapters here in Eagle Lake and by all other chapters around the world.

Lynda Appelt has been selected for the honor of presenting a special message from the International Executive Council of Beta Sigma Phi. Awards will be presented to local members and outstanding members will be recognized for their work for sorority and the community this year.

This women's social, service and cultural organization celebrates its anniversary on this date, with "Founder's Day" activities ranging from

small gatherings to huge banquets for its many members. Beta Sigma Phi is the largest Greek letter sorority in the world, and has grown in its 51-year history from one chapter of seven women to a sorority of 250,000 members active in 12,500 chapters in countries throughout the world.

Beta Sigma Phi members have this year formed new chapters in such faraway places as Korea, Indonesia, Turkey, Bahrain and the Netherlands. More chapters will soon be formed in the West Indies and American and Western Samoa. This effort to spread Beta Sigma Phi and form new chapters is symbolic of two goals shared by all members of the organization: that it extend the hand of friendship to community women; and to enjoy, to the fullest extent, the opportunities for personal growth that Beta Sigma Phi offers every member.

Over 100 Attend Chelation Seminars Here Last Sunday

Over one hundred persons attended the two informative sessions on cardiovascular chelation at The Farris 1912 last Sunday afternoon. The program was arranged by the Houston Area Chelation Club, Mrs. Eva Hobbs president.

Five doctors and a number of former chelation patients were on hand for the meetings and presented information on the new treatment for victims of strokes, diabetes, poor circulation and hardening of the arteries.

Dr. Paul McGuff, owner of a clinic in Houston which administers the chelation treatment, described the chelation therapy and its uses in treatment of diseases and results obtained by the treatment.

He noted that chelation is a form of therapy aimed at reducing calcium deposits in the arteries and other parts of the body. The treatment involves injecting small amounts of an amino acid, disodium ethylenediamine tetraacetic acid (EDTA) in the venous bloodstream. He said that EDTA has the unique and valuable property of being powerfully attracted to

ionic calcium and binds itself to the calcium in the body. The EDTA calcium complex then is excreted through the kidneys and passed in the urine while the fats and cholesterol from the hardened arteries are altered in the liver and passed out through the G.I. tract.

He commented that the chelation therapy generally takes from 30 to 40 treatments, about three per week, that require 3 to 4 hours at each treatment period. He acclaimed the process as being "nifty percent successful and often makes unnecessary much more costly heart by-pass surgery."

Testimonies Given Enthusiastic testimonies were given on the effectiveness of chelation therapy by two former patients of Dr. McGuff's clinic. The first was Robert Von Der Au, former mayor of Wharton and now owner of a Ford-sales and service company and of Pier 59 in Wharton, who spoke enthusiastically about the possibilities of the process "as a living example." He said that before taking the chelation therapy he had

suffered a severe heart condition coupled with resulting ailments. Today, he is one of the chelation therapy's foremost spokesmen and says he is enjoying excellent health.

Another staunch supporter of the chelation therapy is Dean Baxter who is public relations director for ARCO (Atlantic-Richfield Inc.) of Houston and active in dozens of organizations. He refused to undergo by-pass surgery and took the chelation therapy and he also enjoys good health today.

Both Von Der Au and Baxter emphasized that once the chelation therapy is completed there are other conditions which must be met to continue good health.

They encouraged all to have a good, strong positive mental attitude "in how you feel and act and to have good thoughts."

They emphasized that a good nutrition program should be followed with lots of raw fresh fruit and vegetables, chicken (with skin removed) and fish and very little red meat and no salt.

Exercise is a must, they noted, and encouraged a daily planned exercise program. "Make it fun and convenient," the speakers noted. They encouraged the use of individual size trampolines for exercise programs to "take the shock out of jogging."

Mrs. Eva Hobbs, mother of Mrs. William (Helen) Farris, president of the Houston Area Chelation Club, and Tom Bosse of Richmond, vice-president of the club, presided at the seminars.

The five doctors who administer the chelation therapy and members of the club and former chelation therapy patients, answered questions at the end of each session.

Joe Wyatt Seeks 14th Cong. Position

Former U.S. Congressman Joe Wyatt of Victoria recently announced his candidacy for representative of the 14th Congressional District, which includes Eagle Lake and Colorado County.

"My decision to go to the people of the 14th District with my candidacy was made only after researching the voting record of the current incumbent and seeking the views of a large cross section of public opinion. I was born, reared and educated in this district. People of the 14th District deserve to be heard and their opinions voted in the halls of Congress," Wyatt said in announcing his candidacy.

Wyatt, who is seeking the Republican nomination in the May 1 primary, stated that the goals and policies of the national Republican Party "are consistent with the conservative beliefs of most citizens in the 14th District."

Wyatt also said that current Congressman Bill Patman of Ganado has a voting record on economic issues that is "consistent with the voting records of the most liberal members of the House."

Wyatt is an advocate of a balanced federal budget and the concept of "new federalism." He also believes that farmers and ranchers in the 14th District deserve a "forceful spokesman" in Congress.

The 40-year-old Victoria County native was first elected to Congress in 1978 after serving four terms in the Texas Legislature.

His decision not to seek reelection to Congress in 1980 was made after he entered Bethesda Naval Hospital in Washington, D. C., for treatment of alcoholism. After fully recovering, Wyatt completed his term in Congress compiling a 93 percent attendance record over a two-year period.

While in Congress, Wyatt served on the House Armed Services and Merchant Marine and Fisheries committees.

In addition, he was one of four freshman members of the 96th Congress to sponsor and pass two pieces of legislation. He cosponsored 167 other bills, 33 of which passed.
