Mary Ann Leveridge Asks Re-election To State Bd. Of Ed.

Mrs. A. T. (Mary Ann) Leveridge, Jr., of East Bernard in Wharton County is seeking re-election to the

State Board of Education in the 14th Congressional District.

She has served as the president of the 600,000 member Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, served for eight years as a board member on the Education Region III Service Center in Victoria and chaired the East Bernard library committee, and worked for more than ten years as a volunteer lobbyist for education legislation.
