Vehicle Goes Out Of Control, Thru Fence On 950 S.W.

Edward Knight, Jr. of R. 1, Eagle Lake, was driving a 1977 Buick south on FM 950 3.5 miles south of Garwood at 2:30 p.m. last Sunday when a left rear tire blew out and the vehicle went into a spin and north through a fence on the west side of the roadway. Colorado County people can count on getting their money's worth in weight through the year if the products are weighed on local scales or gas pumps. Agricultural Commissioner Reagan V. Brown reports.

In the county there are 515 weighing devices of different types, ranging from 245 fuel pumps to 216 supermarket scales.

"Our department regularly checks the commercial scales in the county and has found that they conform to our previous surveys across the state. Of those that were above or below tolerance, no many scales were off by significant amounts. Also, as many were giving the customer too much of the product as were giving too little. Because of frequent checks, scales are not out of calibration very long," Brown said.

"Business owners are glad to see us come in because as often as not, they have been losing money if their scales were not accurate," Brown said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has inspectors assigned to every county. They are trained to check all different types of scales from those for medicines in a pharmacy to those for livestock and grain.

Budget Battle Continues

More and more as the budget battle progresses, it looks as if a compromise on defense spending may be a key ingredient to agreement between the Administration and the Congress.

Though the president has not said publicly that he is willing to tone down his \$215-billion-plus request for defense spending in Fiscal Year 1983, his aides on Capitol Hill have indicated that the Administration might compromise if the Congress promises to approve certain new domestic cut-backs and to "get a handle on" the entitlement programs.

Entitlements - much in the news lately - are government programs funded by guaranteed set-asides, such as social security, veterans benefits, medicare, and the like.

In recent years, most of the entitlement programs have had Cost of Living Adjustments, or COLAs, tagged on to keep pace with inflation. The program is that many economists believe, these COLAs have actually out-paced the true rise in the cost of living, and sometimes helped spur inflation on. One thing is certain, the COLAs have increased the drain on the federal budget tremendously.
