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County FB Seeking Queen Entries

Contest, Talent Find, Little Miss Parade
At ELMS June 11

The Colorado County Farm Bureau is now seeking entries for its Queen, Talent Find and Little Miss Parade. This year's contest is scheduled for Friday, June 11th at the Eagle Lake Middle School beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Eligible participants for the Queen contest must be 16-21 years of age by Sept. 1, 1982, be single (defined as never been married), and the daughter or sister of a Colorado County Farm Bureau member. Deadline for entries is June 4th.

Contestants will be judged on appearance, poise, personality, and speech, although other qualities such as grace and charm will be taken into account. They will be required to speak from one to two minutes on a Farm Bureau current event question.

Farm Bureau employees, dealers, service agents and their families and past State Talent Find winners are not eligible to enter.

Winners will compete at the district level which will be hosted by the Colorado County Farm Bureau. County Talent winner will receive a \$250 scholarship. District Talent Find winner and their attendant will receive an expense paid trip to the state convention in Dallas, Nov. 28-Dec. 1, 1982. If the talent act has more than one contestant, expenses will be paid for only two contestants and one escort.

The state winner will be awarded a \$1,000 college scholarship and an expense paid trip to the Texas Farm Bureau High School Citizenship Seminar in Waco during July 1983.

Little Miss Parade Little girls between the ages of three and pre-school six as of June 11, 1982 are eligible for the Little Miss Parade. It will be held prior to the Queen's Contest and Talent Find. Entries must be daughters of Colorado County Farm Bureau members and must not have participated in this event before. This is not a contest but merely a sneak preview of our future queen hopefuls.
