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Two Minor Wrecks In Area Last Wk.

Two minor accidents which resulted in no injuries in this area were investigated during the past week by State Trooper Joe Garcia, including one near Garwood and one in Eagle Lake.

Last Saturday, a two vehicle accident occurred 2.5 miles north of Garwood on State Highway 71. Luke Minarek Crank of Jarwood, driving a 1977 Buick LeSabre, and David Allan Kemp of El Campo, driving a 1975 Mack owned by Landy Vacuum Service of El Campo, were involved in the accident.

According to the investigating officer, Kemp had just pulled out of a driveway and was headed north on Hwy. 71 on the shoulder while faster traffic passed. Crank was on Hwy. 71 and she passed the truck driven by Kemp. After passing, Crank then moved onto the shoulder, without any turn signal according to the report, and the truck struck the rear of her car.

On Monday morning, Trooper Garcia was called to the scene of an accident at the intersection of Mills and Main Streets.

The accident involved a 1979 Pontiac Grand Prix driven by Julia McClintock Gindrat and a Ford LTD driven by Emma Volk.

According to the report, Gindrat attempted to stop at the intersection but slid in some loose gravel into the path of the Waligura automobile which was headed east on Main. Waligura tried to avoid the collision but struck the front of the Gindrat car.

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ELMS Discipline Policy Is Approved

Recommendations Of Committee, Supt. Approved By Board

The board of education of Rice Consolidated School District has accepted the recommendations of Supt. Harold King and a Study Committee on discipline procedures and policies at the Eagle Lake Middle School. Elected to the committee by their peers were ELMS teachers Bea Scott, Charlene Spaniel, Jan Mun, Diane Schneider, Dolores Meisner and Eddie Gibson; and ELMS principal David King was appointed to the committee by Supt. King.

The following recommendations were made and were approved in regard to the ELMS disciplinary program:

- (a) Playground conduct; hallway conduct; classroom and cafeteria conduct; before and after school; and activities other than classroom (extra-curricular).
- (b) Teachers should become better acquainted with and more knowledgeable of rules and procedures. C. Detention Hall be implemented so that teachers may conduct detention hall on an individual basis.
- (c) D. SAC be retained as part of the disciplinary program.
- (d) E. The ELMS discipline program be conducted as follows:

- (1) Rank order of penalties according to severity: detention hall, deprivation of privilege (assignment of tasks other than school duties), corporal punishment, SAC, and suspension.
- (2) The following methods of discipline will be used for the reasons listed. Other reasons shall be identified with the group which is most similar.
- (a) Detention Hall-Detention Hall shall be used primarily for reasons more related to academic than behavioral: repeated failure to take supplies or books to class, repeated failure to have books covered, failure to do

homework or assignments, tardiness, and others.

A consistent or habitual problem may eventually be considered as a behavioral problem and other penalties may be imposed. These cases must be cleared through the principal prior to the penalty. Teachers must observe all policies pertaining to detention hall.

(b) Deprivation of privileges and assignment of tasks other than school duties. These forms are to be used by teachers for classroom misbehavior. They are to be used for the following forms of misbehavior or any other which might fit the group: littering; minor defacing of property; failure to follow classroom rules, repeated talking, eating in class, sleeping in class, other disrupting behavior which interferes with study or teaching (minor); other behavior which violates rights of others (minor) or seriously violates or interferes with the behavioral goals of the campus.

When it becomes obvious to the teacher that these penalties are not or have not produced positive results and a student is a continuing disruption in a class, the teacher should resort to the assistance of the campus principal and more severe penalty may be imposed upon the decision of the principal.

The principal should base his decision upon the evidence and documentation produced by the teacher. Reason for penalty must be adequately supported.

(c) Corporal punishment is recommended at the proper time and in the proper

Mexico City Good Place To Visit But Not To Live, Says Reed

Tom Reed, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Reed of Eagle Lake, was impromptu guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club at noon on Wednesday of last week. Tom presented the program on short notice for Harold L. Williams when another program failed to materialize.

Reed spent eight months in Mexico City where he was studying for his Master's Degree on Mexico's new system of agricultural production introduced several years ago. He noted that the system is designed as an effort to make Mexico self-sufficient without having to import much of its food and agricultural product requirements.

The rest of Tom's talk was, "Mexico City is a nice place to visit but not one where you would want to take up permanent residence."

Mexico City, he said, is the fastest growing city in the world with over fifteen

million people and adding an estimated 2,000 people per day and 200 cars per week.

He noted a heavy demand for goods and services as he related that a \$50 million shopping center was paid off in only three months. Reed said Mexico City has some tremendous problems and political leaders don't appear to be eager to do anything about it. He added that the people of Mexico tend to do things the hard way—get very nervous—get angry easily—be suspicious—live at a fast, "dirty, loud pace."

He expressed concern that some of these undesirable traits are cropping up in America and urged Americans not to let it happen.

(g) Disciplinary measures should fit the offense.

(h) Discipline shall be administered fairly and equally and consistently.

(i) Counseling is strongly encouraged at any and all levels and shall in no way be restrictive.

(j) Notification to parents of disciplinary measures being taken shall occur in a uniform and timely fashion in order that parents be properly and adequately informed.

Conclusion

A considerable effort was made by all involved in this study to adequately address the existing problems and to maintain or promote a proper environment in the best interest of the school, the town, the students, the parents and the teachers.

Other important areas of concern yet to be fully developed or expanded upon include: positive recognition for students, parental involvement, and suitable curriculum and extra-curricular activities. These areas are considered to be extremely important and they should certainly be addressed, concluded the report.

Flowing 125 barrels of oil per day, along with 136,000 CFP casinghead gas, the No. 3 W. W. Fenderson Estate et al was completed successfully as a wildcat by K-B Exploration Company of Houston. Drill site is five miles north of Sheridan.

It was drilled to 10,724-foot total depth and will produce from an interval 8,616 to 8,626 feet into the wellbore. Production tests were run on a 10/64 choke, and tubing pressure registered 700 PSI.

The location is in a 4,278-acre lease in Colorado County's H.T.B.R.R. Survey.

Louis A. Newitt of Houston has filed first production figures on a new gas field in the North Eastern Field. The No. 1U Heiman-Fling showed potential to make 370,000 cubic feet of gas per day on an 8/64 choke. Absolute open

flow was estimated at 630,000 CFPD.

The upper production will be from an interval 3,248 to 3,258 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 1L Heiman-Fling showed potential to make 275,000 cubic feet of gas per day on an 8/64 choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 1,525,000 CFPD.

The lower production will be from an interval 3,405 to 3,410 feet into the wellbore.

The operator has 326 acres leased, with drills in Colorado County's 16GNRR Survey, five miles northeast of Garwood. Total drilling depth was 4,512 feet.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 Charlie Ross, a wildcat venture of B.D.K. Production Company, Inc. of Victoria in

Colorado County. Spudded 2-14-82, the well had reached 6,113 feet total depth. Drillsite was ten miles northeast of Spears.

Glacier Energy, Inc. of Corpus Christi has given up in its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1A G. C. Duncan. It was a wildcat try in the James Ross Survey, Colorado County. The location was 6.5 miles southwest of Eagle Lake.

The No. 1U Goodkier has been given a "dry hole" label by Prairie Producing Company of Houston. Located six miles northeast of Eagle Lake, the well had been spudded 7-22-68. It was located in the Martin D. Ramsey Survey, Colorado County, and had reached 9,677 feet total depth.
