Hay management important

Hay production is very important to most livestock producers. During the winter months, hay provides livestock feed needs when other forages are not available, and the hay must be of adequate quality to meet the protein needs of the livestock. Protein quality of the hay and also the quantity of hay produced are controlled by the amount and kind of fertilizer applied to the hay crop. Fertilizer needs for hay production are determined by a soil test which also helps the producer to apply only the amounts of fertilizer needed without "spending unnecessary money." Generally speaking, fertilizer needs for hay production can be figured by using a rule of thumb. Grass uses nitrogen, phosphorus, and potash in a ratio of 4-1-2 respectively. For example, a ton of 12% crude protein air dry hay uses 40 pounds of nitrogen, 10 pounds of phosphorus, and 20 pounds of potash. The amount and kind of fertilizer used for hay production is directly related to the quality of hay produced and also to the digestibility of the hay. High quality crude protein hay is high in digestibility, and contains less fiber, fewer stems, and more leaf content than low protein hay. Crude protein in hay can be checked by means of a protein analysis performed on a sample of the hay. Low quality protein hay affects the digestibility of the hay as it passes through the animal digestive tract. This low quality hay passes so slowly through the digestive tract that more time is required to break down the forage. For example, when an animal consumes 4 to 5 percent protein hay, this hay passes through the animal system so slowly that the animal cannot possibly eat enough of this low quality hay to maintain itself. For this reason, high quality hay should be produced by cutting the hay at the right stage of growth. As a rule of thumb, most grasses should be cut for high quality hay when the grass plant reaches the early boot stage of growth. At this stage of growth, the protein quality is highest, in the grass plant. Leave a 3 inch cutting height when cutting the grass for hay, also make the last cutting of hay no later than October 15 of each year. For native hay meadows, make only one cutting of hay per year by July 1.

P.O. Lease, Block Grant Considered By City Council

Eagle Lake City Council, in its session on Tuesday night of last week, discussed terms for a new five-year lease with the United States Postal Service for the use of the Municipal Building for local post office facilities, but delayed any action until a representative of the Postal Service can meet with a committee appointed by Mayor Elmer Struss to iron out details of the proposed lease. The city has leased an estimated 2975 square feet (estimated because city and PS figures vary slightly) for \$5,750 per year. Mayor Struss said that, using the city figures, this amounts to 15¢ per square foot and according to the post office figures, 11¢. The difference in postage comes in the fact that the Postal Service does not include space for walls or for a loading ramp at the rear of the building. The mayor said that he had been in contact with Harold Robbins of the Postal Service that date and the Postal Service offered \$7187 for the annual lease but then agreed to up this to \$7000 per year. The Postal Service wants a five year lease and also a 5-year option plan which the council wants clarification on. Mayor Struss was instructed to contact Robbins and ask him to meet with a committee from the council to discuss the matter. The committee will report recommendations to the council for action in a meeting this month. Under the contract proposed by the Postal Service, the city would be responsible for maintenance of the building (roof, walls, cement flooring) and the Postal Service for other fixtures, flooring and utilities. The current contract expires on Dec. 31, 1982. Councilman Ralph Truly, who was named by Mayor Struss as chairman of the committee to meet with Robbins, indicated that he would work for more compensation per square foot. Also on the committee will be Councilman Gene Baker and City Manager Robert Klockman.

Community Block Grant
The city council discussed the possibility of resupplying for a Community Development Block Grant from HUD (Housing and Urban Development Dept.) for proposed improvements in the "Rice Mill" area in the eastern part of the city.

Mayor Elmer Struss pointed out the fact that the Eagle Lake Industrial Development Foundation is purchasing property border-

ing this area and should give emphasis to future development of the area. The request filed last year with HUD for a \$500,000 block grant for the removal of dilapidated buildings was turned down because the request did not score the required points for funds under the 1981 program.

The application last year was for \$650,000 all federally financed. The city received a community development block grant in 1978 and this project has been completed and final payment of \$1,045 made to Community Management Services, Inc. for preparing and supervising the project in the "Plat" area of the city.

Klockman reported that Community Management will update the 1981 application for a fee of \$750.00. Other Action
In other business Tuesday night of last week, Milton Anderson appeared before the council to ask the council to help remove certain signs which he described as undesirable and unreligious. Mayor Struss informed him that since the city has no zoning ordinance, the council could not act on such a request.

The council agreed to move a parking meter now in front of General Hardware to a location near the J&D Furniture Co. This will help the hardware store manager, a handicapped wheel-chair patient, to use the area for parking during hours when he is required to be at the store.

To conclude the session, the mayor and councilmen offered suggestions for the betterment of the community and on maintenance projects which they would like the city to act on.
