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New Trespass Laws Tougher

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said hunters and fishermen in the state should be aware that the state's trespass laws now have more teeth.

Persons trespassing to hunt with firearms or bow and arrow are subject to "Class A" misdemeanor charges, which carry a fine of not more than \$2,000 and/or not more than one year in jail. The Class A misdemeanor trespass also includes entering a person's habitation, whether or not the trespasser is carrying a weapon.

House Bill 717 enacted by the 67th Texas Legislature went into effect last Sept. 1 and it increased fines and/or jail sentences for those caught trespassing.

Officer fires shot Police solve two burglaries; arrest five

Two juveniles from Eagle Lake were caught in a home on Prairie Street last week and a third arrested a short distance away after the resident in the house heard the tripping to break in. The arrests led to the recovery of merchandise stolen at another home the previous week.

Mrs. Donald Bendy told police she heard the front door bell ring several times, but by the time she went to the door, she heard someone trying to enter the house at 100 East Prairie through the rear door.

She immediately went to a neighbor's house to call police about 5:15 p.m. and another neighbor saw the juveniles return to the front door and enter the house. They could not gain access through the locked rear door.

Chief of Police Earl Winebrenner answered the call and when he arrived at the house, he asked a neighbor to watch the front of the house while he went around the back. At that time, two of the young boys came out of the back door. One stopped, but another carrying a large stick continued to run. That suspect stopped after Winebrenner told him to stop several times, eventually firing a warning shot over the juvenile's head.

The third subject was arrested at the intersection of State and Lake streets.

Winebrenner said the three were charged with burglary and will face action in the county juvenile court. During questioning, the trio implicated two other juveniles who were arrested before 8 p.m. that night for breaking into the Debra Frenzel home on Union Street and stealing glassware, which was recovered by local officers.

A third person, Johnny Braddock, 17, of Matthews, was also arrested in the investigation, and charged with burglary. Bond was set at \$5,000 by Justice of the Peace M. M. Jones. Braddock was lodged in the county jail in Columbus in lieu of the bond.

Rice CISD board to hear TABS test results Monday

The board of education of the Rice Consolidated Independent School District will hear a report on district-wide results of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS) tests during the session at 8:00 p.m. Monday night in the administration building on the Rice High School campus in Altair. All interested parents are invited to attend the meeting to hear the reports.

During March of this school year, Rice CISD third, fifth and ninth grade students were administered the TABS criterion-referenced tests. School officials note that individual student results have been mailed to parents with their student's report cards. The TABS test relates test items to specific objectives or levels of proficiency in skills students are expected to have mastered in reading, writing, and mathematics. Note Rice CISD Superintendent Harold King.

He added that the TABS test results should indicate to both school district personnel and the patrons of the Rice School District the strengths and weaknesses in these curricular areas and serve as directives for further progress.

Sidewalk issue set for council vote

A permit to hold a sidewalk sale will be needed by local merchants by the end of the month if all goes according to the plans of Eagle Lake city council.

Meeting in regular session Tuesday night, council approved a set of rules involving sidewalk sales. It is anticipated that city attorney W. W. Shurt will present council's recommendations to them in the form of an ordinance, which council said Tuesday night it would vote on at the next meeting.

Also on Tuesday, council gave Mayor Elmer Struss the OK to sign a lease with the United States Postal Service for the space the post office rents in the municipal building.

Before the post office lease was approved, council and several members of the audience again discussed the sidewalk situation.

At last meeting, Mayor Struss appointed a committee of several councilmembers to study the situation and make recommendations. Council told the committee to return with recommendations involving a permit system.

Councilman Roy Dean Van Nort chaired the committee. The rules included:

- Only local, Eagle Lake, merchants are eligible to hold sidewalk sales on the downtown sidewalks.
- Sidewalk sales will be permitted only on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- No organizations or merchants will be allowed more than two sidewalk sales prior to December 31, 1982.
- Permits must be applied for by the merchant at least 48 hours prior to the sale.
- Each applicant must provide the city with an agreement that the merchant is assuming liability for any accident (which might occur) as a result of their merchandise on the sidewalk, and a certificate of insurance protecting the city.

Two major points of discussion arose after the rules were read by city manager Robert Klockman. Councilman Mike Duarte suggested that non-profit organizations be exempted from any of the regulations.

Several councilmembers called for a vote, and it was approved.

On this vote, and several others regarding sidewalk sales, Councilman Ralph Truly abstained. He said council's opinion was the city needed no such regulations to make an agreement.

Fred Beth, owner of Rice Drugs on Main Street, supported the move to eliminate non-profit organizations from the regulations, and asked council to reduce the regulation concerning the display of "injurious" merchandise.

It calls for annual rent of \$7,800 for each of the five years of the contract, with council responsible only for the building's structure, and the postal service responsible for all other maintenance. Under the previous lease, the city was responsible for all maintenance.

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Weight room available starting Tuesday

If you are looking for a new way to exercise this summer, or just looking to keep the shape you have, the weight room at Rice High School will be open starting next Tuesday. And, there will be no charge.

According to Clifton Darden, athletic director, the room, just off the main gym, will be available from 7 to 9 p.m. each Tuesday and Thursday.
