Pecan foliage

Forrest Tent Caterpillars, commonly called webworms, and walnut caterpillars have invaded the pecan trees of Colorado County in a major way.

Both worms are very destructive to the pecan tree with the walnut caterpillar being the most serious as they are voracious feeders and can strip the foliage of a pecan tree in a few days if left uncontrolled.

Initial infestations of the tent caterpillars can be controlled by clipping out the webs from the lower limbs. Fortunately the life style of the tent caterpillar is such that they usually infest the lower limbs of a tree first and then progress upwards into the tree.

Defoliation of the pecan tree at this time of the year will insure a poor pecan nut fill this year and no pecans for one to three years.

Rice-field water to be monitored

The Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment

Station will jointly monitor irrigation water use in the Texas rice belt, according to civil engineer Richard Bettge.

A wide cross section of soils in six rice fields in Jackson, Colorado, Wharton, Fort Bend and Waller counties is being monitored.

"With data obtained from this study we should be better equipped to make recommendations on irrigation managements in the area," Bettge said.

The study will determine the amount of water applied to the crop, the amount of runoff, the amount of water needed for good crop growth and the amount of water lost through percolation and in field canals.

The field and climatological data will be processed at the experiment station and stored for the future use of the farmers in the area.

Project funding is provided by the Lakeland Irrigation Co., Garwood Irrigation Co., Texas Rice Research Foundation, Esmo Rice, Rockwell International, Soil Conservation Service and the Experiment Station as well as local soil and water conservation districts.

Mary Leopold represents RHS at Girls State

Representing Rice High School at Girls State recently was Mary Leopold of Nada, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe A. Leopold.

She was sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 251, Garwood Lions Club and Eagle Lake Rotary Club.

During the Girls State session she was elected Chilli County tax assessor-collector.

Girls State was organized as a national Americanism activity in 1937 by the American Legion Auxiliary. Non-partisan and non-political, the purpose of the Girls State program is to provide citizenship training for girls of high school age; to afford them an opportunity to live together as a

self-governing group; and to inform them of their duties, privileges, rights, and responsibilities which they will assume when they become adults. They learn the problems of government by assuming the duties of city, county, and state officials as stipulated by the Texas Legislature. Each year citizens are selected at local levels from students who have just completed their junior year in high school. The selection is based principally on leadership, character, and scholarship.

The 1982 session of the American Legion Auxiliary Texas Bluebonnet Girls State has grown from an experimental conference of ninety-four girls, held at Baylor University in 1941, to become the largest single extracurricular educational program for high school girls in Texas. This year 500 girls were in attendance, making a total of more than 15,000 girls in Texas who have participated in this top-level citizenship program.

Chief Justice Joe Greenhill of the Texas Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the elected state officials of Bluebonnet Girls State, Monday, June 21, in the Rotunda of the State Capitol. The Honorable William Clements, Governor of Texas, was guest speaker at the inauguration.

During the session the citizens were privileged to hear the following guest speakers: Ms. Marjorie Wilhelm, Houston, head of Anti-trust and Litigation of Conoco, Inc. of Houston; Dr. Virginia C. Kennedy, director of Program Development and Associate Professor of Health, The University of Texas School of Public Health, Houston; Dr. Mary Ann Wycoff, Research Consultant of the Police Foundation, Washington, D. C. and Ms. Ann Richards, former Texas State Commissioner and Democratic Nominee for Texas State Treasurer. Each of these speakers were at one time citizens of Girls State and elected officials of the mythical state and represented Texas Girls State at Girls Nation in Washington, D. C.

More demonstrations

Cattle grub control demonstrations using a pour-on type insecticide were established recently on the Richard Frank place near Bernardo and Edgar Koehn place near New Blau.

The hee fly has laid their eggs for this grub season and the nature grubs, if left untreated will appear under the hide of the cattle's back in the period of late November to February. Pour-on type insecticides may be effectively used to systemically control these parasites during the mid June through August period.
