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4-H for everyone

Today's 4-H program is for all youth-rural and urban-from all racial, cultural, economic and social backgrounds.

4-H reaches girls and boys in a variety of ways: as members of organized 4-H clubs, as participants in special interest groups, and as enrollees in short-term projects. It reaches them through television, camping and other educational methods, and in programs planned to meet specific needs of youth and communities where they live.

4-H involves young people everywhere-in big cities and little towns, on Indian reservations, and in the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands and Guam. Activities are typically conducted in the homes of members or their leaders, in schools or in other community buildings.

Youth organizations in more than 80 countries around the world have adapted the 4-H idea. Opportunities for individual, club, community, state, national and international projects and activities are available through 4-H.

Today's 4-H gives young people an opportunity to take an active part in learning about and solving problems that face them and their communities. These include problems of environment, health and use of drugs.

Members participate in projects that give them knowledge of science, agriculture, home economics, personal development,

community service, leadership and citizenship. Often this knowledge helps open the door to a future career.

But the main purpose of 4-H is to help youth become effective citizens.

Popular with city, suburban and rural young people alike are projects in community development, electricity, environmental protection and conservation, home gardening, photography, public speaking, woodworking, entomology, small engines, grooming and personal development.

Older girls and boys find satisfaction and challenge in projects in automotive care and safety, career studies, money management and leadership.

Flexibility is the key to today's 4-H projects-flexibility in the kinds of learning offered and in the variety and size of projects. For instance, one of the fastest growing is a horse project for youth who don't own horses.

In 4-H it's kids that count. And that's an investment in the future.

Farm Bureau to hold citizenship seminar

Karen Rucka and Becky Benge of Eagle Lake plan to attend the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar for junior and senior high school students on the Baylor University campus in Waco.

Also attending to represent Colorado County will be Janet Hatterman of Weimar and Melissa Hunt of Columbus. The seminar is scheduled for July 19-22.

"They were chosen to represent Colorado County because of their leadership ability, scholastic achievement and character," said Ted Brandt, Colorado County FB president.

The seminar, which runs for three full days, is designed to give these

selected high school students a better understanding of the various forms of government and their responsibilities as citizens. Comparisons of the different kinds of economic systems are outlined in lectures, discussions and films presented by outstanding authorities in government, history, and economics.

Several excellent speakers will be at this year's seminar. They include Dr. Clifton Ganus, president of Harding University, Searcy, Arkansas, who will cover "Understanding and Preserving our American Heritage."

Alex Shekkel, a Russian immigrant who now lives in Waco, will discuss "The Real Russia" as he left it five years ago. Glenn J. Kimber, vice-president of the Freeman Institute in Salt Lake City, Utah, will speak on "Miracle of America."

Dr. Thomas Cunningham, family life specialist from Stillwater, Oklahoma, will speak on "Citizenship and the Family." The topic of Jack Jackson's speech will be "The Price of Free Enterprise." He is an instructor with American Airlines in Fort Worth.

Students attending the citizenship seminar will be eligible to enter the TFB Young Speakers for Free Enterprise contest.
