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WHICH UNIT SHOULD I BUY?
A UNIT WITH AN EER OF 8 OR MORE

Confused about which air conditioning unit to buy?

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (A.C.L.U.) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made A.C.L.U. very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The A.C.L.U. is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One can not escape the conclusion that the A.C.L.U. would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

Local gifted child attends workshop

James Petrosky, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Petrosky of Columbus, was one of 27 gifted deaf children from seven states that participated in a Boys Town Institute for Communication Disorders in Children workshop at Boys Town, Nebraska, during the month of July.

Youth ages 13 through 17, took part in a program designed to awaken latent potential in gifted deaf youth.

"We felt we had to do something about all these bright, deaf kids," said Dr. Patricia Sullivan, director of the program. "If gifted children are one of our most valuable resources, then those found within a handicapped population are priceless," she added.

A highlight in the program was a drama workshop held by renowned deaf dramatist Bernard Bragg of Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C.

Among the subjects studied by the youth were

water resources, geology, hydrology, wildlife, computers and career development. A follow-up program will attempt to measure how the youth achieve when they return to their home schools.

Dr. George Propp of the Barkley Memorial Center at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, is co-directing the program with Dr. Sullivan. Dr. Propp, an educator of the hearing impaired, is deaf himself.

Money for the learning program was provided by regional Sertoma Clubs and the Nebraska Commission for the Hearing Impaired. A pre-program evaluation of each child's medical, audiological, psychological and communication status was provided by the Boys Town Institute. Boys Town also

provided lodging for the students on the Boys Town campus.

The youths involved in the program were from Texas, Minnesota, Iowa, South Dakota, Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska.

In the letter, Shapiro stated: "You are surely to be congratulated on this fine attainment, for you are one of only 22 students who qualified for this award during the 1981-1982 academic year."

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
