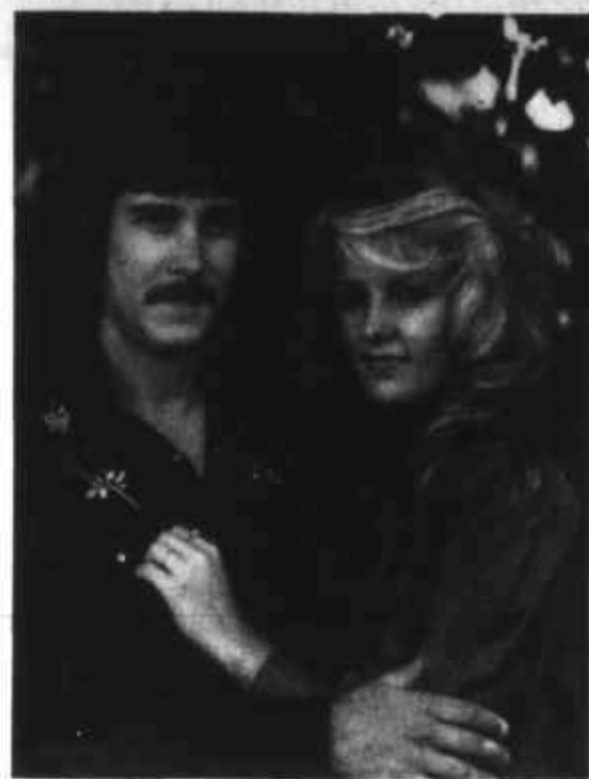

The family of the late Rev. Marshall Simmons rendered a memorial service at the White Cloud Baptist Church with the Rev. O. Rhodes as pastor. The service began at 11:30 a.m. with tributes read from the first family which included Mrs. Ida (Simmons) Ware of Oakland, California; Mrs. Beatrice (Simmons) Stovall of Eagle Lake and Scott Simmons of Houston. Other tributes were from the late Ella (Simmons) Benson family, the late John Simmons family, the late Laura (Simmons) Daniel family and from the grandchildren and great, great grandchildren of the late Mrs. Williams who were both in the organization of the White Cloud Baptist Church.

The late Rev. Simmons was born in Louisiana but was raised in Fayetteville, Texas by his parents. He received his schooling in Fayetteville and taught school in Bastrop for several years. He met and married Miss Florida Harvey when they were young and to this union nine children were born. Somewhere along the way they moved to Eagle Lake, out in New Town which was called Beau Dock at the time. There were few people and lots of Beau Dock trees. He would carry the children to Friendship and Mt. Olive Baptist Church for Sunday School and service. He saw the need for a church in this community as they always had so far to walk to service elsewhere, so along with their mother, his children, Mrs. Caroline Choice, Mrs. Eliza Williams and about four others, they met in the homes and organized the White Cloud Baptist Church. Finally they were able to build a small building to worship in. Their father was the kind of man who loved to travel about, telling the good news about our Lord and Saviour. So as soon as he was able to find someone to pastor the church, namely Rev. E. A. Combs of Bonus, he then set out on his missionary journey spreading the good news. The last place he went was Imperial, California. This is where God called him home, May 22, 1921. His remains were brought back here to Eagle Lake where he is buried.

He was a stern but loving father always wanting comfort for his wife and children, a very religious man who feared God and hated evil. He raised his children to fear God. There was always altar prayer in our home. He loved us and we loved him. He was dedicated in his duty to serving his fellow man and helping those whom he considered to be less fortunate.

Whereas, God saw fit to call him home 61 years ago he would be 127 years in age now. Today we are happy to be the children and offspring of such a wonderful person. He was a noble father, loved by every one he knew. Every one he tried to help. And smiled the whole day through. He served and loved his master. And tried his best to do. Was always helping others. A life so noble, kind and true. Oh we have missed his bright smile. And all his loving ways. But we meet him at the end of our day.

He leaves one surviving son, Scott Simmons of Houston; two daughters, Ida (Simmons) Ware of Oakland, California and Beatrice (Simmons) Stovall of Eagle Lake. The deceased children are Effie (Simmons) Jackson, Ella (Simmons) Benson, Laura (Simmons) Daniel, Sarah (Simmons) Guess, and John and Cyrus Simmons.
