Deer hunters enjoyed season

Hunters harvested an estimated 300,000 white-tailed deer during the 1981 hunting season in Texas. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said although the total was the highest since 1979, the statewide harvest during the past decade has continued to show a decline.

The harvest estimates were calculated from a computerized statewide mail survey of licensed hunters after the 1981 hunting season.

In the 1973-74 hunting season, hunters took approximately 304,000 deer. The estimated harvest declined to a low of 272,000 in 1978-79, and has yet to rebound to early 1970s levels.

The second highest harvest was noted in the South Texas Plains, where hunters took an estimated 50,800 whitetails. Hunter success was calculated at 49 percent in that region.

Sedson football tickets
