Many new books of
fiction, biography, and
various subject headings
like history, art, sports and
prophecies have been
shelved this past week.
If mystery is your
favorite, try Elizabeth
Levy's "The Case of the
Wild River Ride." It is a
plunge into terror. Jody
and Jake's exciting vaca-
tion explodes into a
nightmare of terror and
danger when they find
themselves abandoned in
the wilderness. Taking a
trip down the Colorado
River, through some of the
most dangerous rapids in
America, their party
rescues a man who tells
them that he is a sheriff
whose raft capsized while
he was chasing an escaped
killer. They take the
sheriff in with them, and
the next night Jody
discovers a deadly scorpion

in her sneaker. Jody
suspects it was not an act
of nature.
Jody's suspicions turn to
conviction the next day
when Jody and Jake find
one of the raft's ripped
shreds and their friends
gone! Jody wonders who
kidnapped the others and
why? Was there more than
one person involved? She
and her brother are
determined to solve the
mystery and to rescue
their friends, but to do so,
they have to risk their
lives. Courageously, they
decide to go down the river
on their own—running the
rapids without a raft! All
adventure fans will enjoy

To capture the heart of

"Planet of the Warlord."
In his continuing quest to

help of Giv, his alien
companion, Kell at last
learns the truth about the
Warlord.

In a series of terrifying
episodes, Kell battles the

Deathwing and the Giv's
help, escapes what seems
to be certain death or
enslavement by the War-
lord. The story races to a
thrilling and explosive
climax as Kell and Giv
take on the most powerful
foe of all in a desperate bid
to save the galaxy.

Rich in storytelling
power is Mildred Taylor's
"Let the Circle Be Un-
broken." The year is 1935,
deep in the Depression.
Beneath the placid rolling
fields of the Mississippi

countrywide, old racial
antagonisms fester and
new conflicts stir, fed by
hard times. The young
Logans watch as T.J., their
friend, is charged with
murder and tried by an
all-white jury; as des-
perately poor sharecropper
neighbors—white as well as
black—are victimized by
the greed of large land-
owners and forced to plow
under fields of healthy
cotton. But Big Ma, Mama
and Papa believe that
strength can be born in
adversity, and they teach
the children the pride and
self-respect they need to
survive.

These books just number
among the many that have
arrived. Visit the library
and find your favorite book
for hours of peaceful
relaxation.
