Raiders remain winless, scoreless

The Rice Raiders fought another long losing streak on the football field last week but again came home scoreless. The Hallettsville Brahmas won 26-0.

Friday the raiders open their home season in Altair against Needville.

Mistakes again were part of the problem as the Raiders remain scoreless and winless for the young 1982 season. Opportunities did present themselves, but the young raiders were not able to take advantage of them.

Hallettsville's first score came with little more than five minutes to go in the first quarter when quarterback James Klimitchek scored on a two-yard run.

In the second quarter, with the score still 7-0 Hallettsville, Phillip Schorlemmer intercepted a pass and ran the ball down to their 30. The Raider offense moved the ball down to the 11 yard line before they stalled. An attempted field goal was blocked, ending the Raider's first scoring chance.

However, on Hallettsville's next series of plays, they were not able to keep the ball moving and were forced to punt on fourth down. The snap went over the kicker's head deep into Hallettsville territory. The Raiders were not able to recover the ball, and Hallettsville punter James Williams picked it up, evaded three Raiders and moved the ball to the 50 yard-line for another first down.

The third opportunity presented itself when Charlie Amos trapped Klimitchek causing a fumble, which Darren Lanyon

recovered on the Hallettsville 43. Unable to move the ball again, Rob Johnson superbly placed a punt on their one yard line.

The Brahmas of Hallettsville fumbled in that series of play, but the raiders again missed an opportunity when they could not recover the ball. A Brahma player recovered it for a first down.

Six plays later, with only 38 seconds remaining, the Brahmas took the ball into the Raider end zone making the halftime score 14-0.

The second half proved to be no better for the Raiders as the third Hallettsville score came when Klimitchek chunked the ball over the middle in

a desperate pass attempt, and James Williams caught it dashing 30-yards into the end zone. The point after touchdown was blocked.

Troy Corman was able to take advantage of a pass interference call on the next series of plays to move the ball into Hallettsville territory for Rice's first and only penetration, but a holding call later stopped another drive.

The Brahmas were not able to move the ball, and punted to Mel Pratt. The Raiders made two first downs, but were not able to keep it going and Johnson punted again.

After two more exchanges of the ball, which

Corman was attempting to pass, a Brahma defender knocked the ball loose and Hallettsville recovered.

Two plays later, they took the ball for their fourth score of the night, but again failed on the extra point kick.

At that point, with less than three minutes to go in the game, Pratt came in as quarterback, and the team gained two first downs. But the game ended before they could maneuver in for a score.

Dwayne Pagel was the Raider rushing leader with 43 yards and Rob Johnson moved for 26. Losses by other runners held the total Rice yardage on the ground to 61 yards. Rice

rushed the ball 29 times. The Raiders threw the ball eight times with only one completion which was an 18-yard gain to Pagel. Hallettsville threw seven times with three completions for 64 yards gained in the air. The Brahmas rushed on the ground 50 times with 228 yards on the ground.

Johnson led the defense with 10 tackles and seven assists, and Amos was credited with seven tackles and five assists, including one quarterback sack and one extra point kick blocked. Lanyon was credited with one fumble recovery, and Schorlemmer caught the lone Rice pass interception.
