CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that when ever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Hubbard—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "fuel" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety." In that case, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. I fear, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly buried it. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fund-raiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgraceful. It is obvious that we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer. Bill Hobby will have to go.

This year's third annual South Central Texas Beef Cattle Symposium will focus on developing the right kind of animal that will bring top dollars to producers. The symposium is slated for October 28 at the Hallettsville Livestock Commission. Registration from 8 to 9 a.m. will kick off the day-long program, said Billy Paul, DeWitt County Extension agent who is handling publicity for the event. Highlighting the program will be live cattle demonstrations and com-

munity's businesses, which are the heart of a healthy city. However, I did have an unanswered question about the fair booth. It was not personally manned during the fair, except when a couple of members spent a few hours there. T. J. Smith looked after it when he had the time away from his own booth (for Moseman's feed) and from fair activities. T. J. put the chamber booth next to his purpose, so he could watch out for it.

But had the booth been manned all the time, it may have shown those walking by more about the city. Who knows when opportunity knocks, and opportunity in the form of someone wanting more information about our town may have passed us by.

Statistics Numbers are fun, at least I think so. So to justify the computer, and rationalize all the time, I like to spend in front of it. I have several reports I print through the month, about the business. An interesting one surfaced last week. Each Wednesday after we get the papers out, Jeannine measures it for the post office report as required by our Second Class mailing permit, then I use the numbers in an advertising space report. One of the things I keep track of each week is the printing expense, which is 10 percent of our total expenses.

However, that news to advertising ratio is still close to last year when there was 45.24 percent advertising, compared to this year with 52.75 percent, not counting supplements, like Miller's and Wilcox.

My resignation was tendered so that the Rice CISD would not be prevented from employing a fine teacher who happened to be related to me. When you elected me some one and one-half years ago, I certainly intended to serve my full term, indeed I hope to have the opportunity to serve you again. We are so fortunate to have a fine school district, even though the tax burden is difficult to bear in times like these.

The basic truth of the matter is that every taxpayer shares in the

benefits of a school system that produces intelligent, industrious, solid citizens. Conversely, we have only to read the papers to see the results of poorly administered, negative school systems. The local school district remains the single best investment that any of us can make in the future of our communities, and our society as a whole.

We are blessed with an excellent school staff and administration. The Board of Trustees plays an ever more important role in providing guidance to the school district. A special election will be called to fill my position; all of us must participate in the selection of an individual who will provide the leadership so necessary to furthering the education of our children. Thank you for the confidence you placed in me, and I do hope to serve you again in the not too distant future.
