

## Sheriff's department investigates 3 incidents

Officers in the Colorado County Sheriff's Department investigated three incidents during the past week.

At 6:42 p.m. on September 23, the sheriff's office was advised of a subject creating a disturbance in Altair. Deputies H. O. Moore and Bill Esterling responded to the call and located Derory Mark Stark, 24 years of age, from Houston, who now resides in Altair. Stark was fined \$213 for disorderly conduct.

Also on September 23rd, at 9:30 p.m., Jodie Scott of Houston reported the theft of some hogs in Altair. Scott raises hogs in Altair and stated that at least three of the hogs had been stolen. The investigation resulted in one subject being filed on for theft. The subject is being sought by officers at this time. Other subjects may be filed on in connection with the theft, according to sheriff's officers.

At 9:47 p.m. on September 25th, the sheriff's office was advised of a subject firing a handgun at the Lakeside Inn near Borden. Investigation revealed the subject to be Nick Mata, 40 years of age, from Weimar. Mata was arrested and a 22 caliber pistol was confiscated. He was charged with discharging a firearm on a licensed premises and with aggravated assault as he had threatened a subject at the club with the weapon, according to investigating officers.

Mata remains in the Colorado County Jail in lieu of \$3000 in bonds set by Justice of the Peace Richard Schmidt. Mata was also fined \$200 for contempt of court when he became belligerent with Judge Schmidt.

## City sets tax, sewer rates

A tax rate of 38 cents per \$100 taxable property valuation, and a new sewer rate, were items adopted by Eagle Lake City Council Tuesday night.

The tax rate is the same as council discussed during its last meeting two weeks ago, and is based on the certified tax role given the city by county appraisal collector Billy Youns.

That rate will raise \$175,000 in revenues for the city, but recent history indicates the collection level may be only about 90 percent, giving the city about \$158,000 actual revenues.

The sewer ordinance was adopted on the heels of the city's planned acceptance of its new sewer plant, scheduled for completion in late October.

The rate is a departure from past rates where flat charges were made for all rate categories.

Under the new rate structure, residences, which make up about 90 percent of the city's sewer revenue, will be charged

\$3.50 for the first 3,000 gallons of fresh water they use, plus 40 cents for each additional thousand gallons.

To establish how much water a residence uses, in order to establish how much the sewer charge will be, the city will average the January, February and March water use, and charge you accordingly.

The three-month average was established as an attempt to provide a fair water-use rate for water that will go into the sewer system. It eliminates charging customers based on summer water usage, which includes more car washing and lawn watering, which does not contribute to sewer plant use.

For commercial customers, the sewer charge each month will be based on water used the previous month. Under the old rate structure there were six flat rate categories, with the highest set at \$12.50 per month for hotels and similar businesses.

Although work remains to be done at the sewage plant, the construction company building it began flowing city sewerage into the plant's system. Checks have been run on the plant's main operations and there have been no problems reported.

Council also discussed but took no action on an 11-page ordinance regulating what can and cannot be put in the sewer lines feeding the new plant. For instance, non-polluted water such as rain water, could not be put into sanitary sewer lines, if the new ordinance is adopted.

Although the ordinance will increase regulations residents must follow, the federal government suggested the ordinance be adopted to maximize the efficiency of the sewage plant, which is a health related operation.

In other business, council talked about the city's application for federal funds to improve lower income portions of the city. In previous years the city has asked for grants for several purposes, but this year will ask for a single-purpose grant. City manager Robert Klockman said there probably will be up to 30 such grants made in Texas for up to a half-million dollars each. A public hearing on the grant application will be scheduled for October.

## Wyatt supports economic policies

Congressional candidate and former Congressman Joe Wyatt spoke in Eagle Lake Tuesday night as more than 25 people listened then asked questions.

The occasion was a special reception for the candidate at the city's community center. It was hosted by a group of local republicans and Wyatt supporters.

Wyatt, a republican from Victoria, faces Democrat incumbent Bill Patman in the November elections. He was introduced here by Mark Anderson.

In his opening remarks, Wyatt explained the issues he has based his campaign on, and as you might expect, told the attentive audience where he stands in relation to his opponent.

"Articulate the thoughts of those whom he represents as well as his own beliefs," is what Wyatt said a congressman should do. To that extent, his top campaign issue is the support of the current republican platform in regards to the country's economic situation. He said he would have voted for the budget and tax cuts put forth by the administration of President Ronald Reagan.

Wyatt has been in contact with the republican house leadership in Congress, and has been assured the leadership would help him secure a seat on the agricultural committee, although such assignments are not made until after the new congress meets next year.

Wyatt also favors the amendment, he feels Patman must not really support it since he won't sign the release to get the bill out of committee for a House vote.

Wyatt also favors the \$200 billion spending level for defense.

Continued from Page 1A since the gravel pits already provide a place to dump. Second, he said he firmly is for action to prevent the dumping, if other commissioners would also support him.

The county has no legal position to prevent the dumping. State law does not give counties land control powers. Stiles would like to begin action that makes the dumping difficult through various means that include road weight limits, causing delays through road repairs, etc.

The Spirit contract with Houston, calls for the company to move 16,000 tons of the material in 40 truck loads daily, including Saturday and Sunday.

Other minor matters considered by the court included the purchase of additional fire ant bait for the Weimar area, using left-over supplies from the other three precincts as well as purchasing \$1,300 more.
