The Eagle Lake Revitalization Committee, patterned itself after a state-wide program aimed at economic and visual rehabilitation of smaller cities, has set out on its four-step program.

The first step will be a city-wide clean-up campaign the first week of November. Your help is needed.

Patman votes for budget amendment

Congressman William N. Patman (D 14th District, Texas) cast his vote last week on behalf of the constitutional amendment to balance the budget. The amendment failed to achieve the necessary two-thirds majority.

"I doubt that we will be able to take the matter up again this session," said Patman. "But I will be prepared to work and vote for an amendment again next year when I am confident it will come up again."

Patman has supported the notion of such an amendment since 1978 when, as a veteran member of the Texas Senate he supported HCR 13 - a resolution calling for an amendment to the U. S. Constitution requiring an

annual balanced budget. In June of this year he signed on as a co-sponsor of the amendment which was considered by the full House last Friday. Earlier this week he signed the discharge petition, helping to move the amendment out of the House Judiciary Committee where it has been pigeon holed and onto the House floor for consideration.

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On October 3rd at 11:21 a.m. the sheriff's office was advised of some hunters in a pasture near Rock Island.
