In addition to the national recognition received, the award provides the recipients with a copy of William H. Danforth's book "I Dare You". Mr. Danforth wrote the book out of his own experience. You will find that the TAHC personnel will vaccinate your heifer calves free of charge on the farm or veterinarians will do it at no charge if the heifer calves are brought by the clinic. A field service charge is made if the practitioner has to go to the county to perform the service.

Overall goal of the accelerated brucellosis vaccination program is to increase immunity so that Texas livestock will have more freedom of movement in regard to brucellosis regulations.

The present infection rate prevents the entire state of Texas from being classified as a "B" state

A cover sheet should be used, bearing the entrant's name, address, school name, school grade, and Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District No. 333. The entrant's name should not appear on the essay.

Topic for the poster contest is "Resource Conservation." The poster work is to be on standard poster board cut in half size (approximately 22" x 14").

Top winners in both contests will be honored at the Columbus Lions Club's annual awards banquet in the spring. Each will receive an award through the district from Central Power and Light. Certificates will also be awarded to the winners.

Top winners, essay and poster, will be sent to Temple for regional competition. Regional winners will receive trophies.

District informational packets will be distributed to teachers and librarians, upon request.
