More changes in department

Last week I announced the promotion of two deputies within the sheriff's office to allow continuous supervision in the department. During the week, other changes were made. Deputy Carol Supak of Eagle Lake was removed from the midnight dispatching to the administrative responsibility of the department. Martha Jones of Eagle Lake was hired as midnight dispatcher and was also deputized as a jailer to comply with the state's jail standards. This move allows Lt. Lacourse and Deputy Supak to handle the administrative, jail, courts, civil, and transporting of prisoners responsibilities of the department. This allows the patrolling deputies to remain on patrol within the county and not have to be called off the road for these functions. We feel that this will allow us to better serve you.

Commissioners agenda:

In addition to waste disposal, Colorado County Commissioners considered other items as listed on their agenda for their regular monthly meeting held Monday.

Among other items, they appointed an alternate presiding judge for the county road 103 (Columbus-Rock Island) will be held Monday, November 8. There are oil drilling operations in the area, and the heavy equipment has caused destruction of the road. One oil company rebuilt what was destroyed, but since then, other damage has been done.

The limit will allow farm equipment on the road, but if someone wants to move

equipment over 20 tons, they will have to make application to the county.

At present, the county health facilities in Columbus occupies three rooms in the city hall, but the state suggests larger quarters. In September, 360 patients were seen, and this year through last month, 4,565 patients have been seen.

As of January 1, the county will pay the city \$300 month rent, including utilities and custodial services. In looking at other space available, Judge Crank said one building with less than 900 square feet was available for \$440 per month, but he estimated utilities would cost another \$200. He was authorized to discuss the costs with the state. The county is willing to pay \$300 it has budgeted, but would like the state to pay the remainder, if the offices are moved.

Council OK's new ordinance

Eagle Lake residents and businesses have a new ordinance to abide by - this one concerns what can and can't be dumped into sewer lines flowing to the new sewer plant scheduled for completion on October 24.

Adopted Tuesday night at the regular city council meeting, the ordinance was unanimously approved on one reading rather than the normal three readings. Although there was no real emergency expressed, the ordinance is supposed to be in effect before the city can accept the new plant.

The major impact of the ordinance is that it now is against the law in the city of Eagle Lake to allow storm sewer to flow into a sanitary sewer. That water causes the sewer plant to treat non-polluted water, i.e. rain water.

The city now has the authority to require storm drains be disconnected from sanitary sewer lines, and according to Mayor Struss that is the city's intent. Smoke will be induced into sewer lines in an effort to determine where storm drain lines are connected.

Council conducted business on other matters, which will be reported in next week's Headlight.
