A low in the gulf, moist air overrunning cool air, and a series of upper air disturbances are combining to cause very wet conditions in the Coastal Plains. Heavy rains have occurred and more rain is likely through Wednesday. The systems should move on to the northeast and gradual improvement in weather condition is forecast Thursday through Saturday. Temperatures should be on an upward trend late in the week. For all areas of the Coastal Plains, farmers and ranchers West and North of Houston need to keep a close eye on the weather conditions through Wednesday. Where heavy rains have occurred, there is still a good chance for more. Flooding is a possibility in poorly drained areas. Live stock and equipment in low lying areas should be taken to higher ground as a precaution. With the cloudiness and showers, not much evaporation is expected and rain water will either have to soak in or run off. For most growers, field work delays carry into next week. On the plus side, however, late season crops could get a boost as temperatures increase once again and sunshine returns. Grazing prospects should be on the increase in many areas.
