It's open again under new ownership

Doug and Janie Schwemm are the new owners of the Sportsman's Restaurant, 301 Boothe Drive, which they recently

purchased from Fred and Charlotte Brosche.

The restaurant opened under its new name and ownership October 11 after having been closed about ten days for cleaning and refurbishing, which ranged from some landscaping, to the walls in the restaurant, and painting the kitchen. The main dining room will be recarpeted soon.

Janie is a native of Eagle Lake, the daughter of Morris and Florence Morales; while Doug grew up in Wisconsin around Lake Geneva. Both are veteran employees of the Marriott Hotel group, where Doug most recently was director of food and beverages for one of the hotels in Atlanta, Ga.

It wasn't just the opportunity to purchase a restaurant that brought them here. A year ago they purchased the house at 228 Main St., and have been remodeling it. Their original idea was to open a restaurant there, but when they learned Charlotte and Fred were selling their business, they decided to live in the refurbished home, and purchase the restaurant.

Their plans here are simple: "to buy the best product available on the market," to prepare and serve at the Sportsman's, Doug says. They plan to have "fresh beef that has never been frozen, some homemade desserts, special battered seafood items from fish to shrimp; authentic chili, and Mexican dishes. They have upgraded the salad bar, and have biscuits and cornbread, and you can buy breakfast anytime. The menu you receive now is an impressive offering, and essentially is

complete, but the Schwemms still are looking for some purveyors for the quality they demand. Therefore a couple of the items may not yet be available.

As for the staff, you see the same people as before with a couple of new additions.

Lois Davis has been cooking at the restaurant for nine years. Other cooks include Jean Foster, Mildred Williams, Toni Garza and Susan Chapel; waitresses are Frances English, Sue Shingley, Sandra Stephens, Lydia Simpson, Lucy Buffington, Jean Helms and Debra Castro; Alice Glover is dishwasher; and bus help includes Tessie Bibbs, Linda Cardenas, Delroy Davis, Trina Spencer and Tonya Castro. Helen Supak is the cashier and hostess.

The staff at the restaurant will be given a training program and the kitchen staff will learn about the Schwemm's methods of food preparation by recipe. Both Doug and Janie are now helping in the kitchen in the food preparation area as a manner of showing the staff, as well as helping out.

"I love hunting and fishing," Doug says about moving from the metropolitan world of the hotel food business to Eagle Lake. But he also comments that it will be nice to "enjoy going back to the same house, associating with the same people, and seeing my kids go to the same schools," which was not possible with the hotel business. He has lived and worked in six states.

He spent 14 years with Marriott, starting as an assistant restaurant manager. Marriott is the fifth largest food company in

the world, he said, with 104 U.S. hotels and an airline catering business. While in Atlanta he was responsible for 20 man-

agers and more than 400 employees. Janie grew up and went to school here, and although it has been 15

years since she lived in Eagle Lake, she says people who come into the restaurant still recognize her.
