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\$104.9 million in 1981 County wells net

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Colorado County wells in 1981 enriched the county's economy and accounted for \$104.9 million of the \$44 billion value placed on Texas petroleum production last year.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association said the county ranked 99th among Texas' 254 counties.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 449 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$7.6 million in 1981.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county oil and gas operators spent a reported \$60.2 million in the drilling of 80 wells, including 16 wildcat, or exploratory, wells. This effort resulted in the completion of six oil wells and 33 gas wells, although some \$25.9 million was lost in the drilling of 41 dry holes. As of April 1, 1982, there were 412 producing wells in the county; 39 oil and 373 gas.

Processing also contributed to the county economy, with three natural gasoline processing plants, having a total daily capacity of 357.1 million cubic feet of natural gas in operation.

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Klockman helps develop state funding program

Eagle Lake City Manager Robert Klockman, on invitation of Governor Bill Clements' office, is participating with other governmental officials in Texas to develop a program to administer funds the federal government is putting under state control.

Next year the governor's office will be responsible for distributing \$35 million as part of the Community Development Block Grant program created by the federal government.

Under control of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

With approval of council, Klockman attended the first meeting of the group in Austin on October 8, and probably will attend two

more sessions before the program they will recommend to the governor is complete.

As city manager here, Klockman represents the smallest city participating in the development committee. Harvey Westerholm, formerly city manager of Columbus and now city manager in Lufkin, represents the largest city. Others on the committee are various county officials.

The block grant funds are awarded to cities under 50,000 population and counties that apply and are approved. They are designed to be used in low to moderate income areas to develop viable urban environments by creating suitable living conditions and expanding economic

opportunities. There are 1,400 governmental entities eligible to apply. Cities over 50 population automatically receive a grant from the federal government for the block grant program. That will remain under federal control.

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
